





Above: Kelly Spinner and Leisa Richey have fun dressing up in crazy costumes and just joking around. These costumes are definitely taking it to the limit.





float, and of course listening for the sounds of the fire trucks that would be carrying our Rebel football team.










Then, during half time of





















Student Leaders

In December, the annual National Honor Society Induction Ceremony was held.

Twenty-nine members were inducted. They were selected on the basis of scholarship, leadership, character, and service. The students inducted are also active in the community, school, and maintain at least a cummulative grade point average of

The NHS as a group helps to raise funds for charities, presents scholarships and dedicates time to the community. Each member volunteers one hour a week to community service.

The NHS usually chooses a teacher or staff member to become an honorary member of the NHS. This year the NHS chose to posthumously honor Mr. Robert Cochenour who taught 34 years at South Spencer High School.

Mr. Cochenour was fifty-five years of age and died on November 6, just a few months after his retirement.

After the induction ceremonies Mr.

Al Logsdon, former principal, gave the speech.

The student council is another organization that promotes leadership. Its members are active in planning and sponsoring special events that take place at school.

The council plans the homecoming dances and purchases the crowns and flowers for the ceremonies.

During the Christmas season the council visits the local nursing home and sings carols. They are also active at school during the holiday season. Members of the council put up and decorate the Christmas tree in the main hall. Besides merely decorating, they also help others by conducting a food drive.

In the spring they host a breakfast for the teaching staff.





Students who work in the library learn many skills for the future. They learn to use the library correctly, skills of being conscientious, and most importantly, they learn a sense of responsibility.



At Snowball you can express your feelings and be yourself, and not care what other people think of you. You don't have to hide behind a mask, unlike most of us do at school.





Observation, design and experiment, hypothesis, data gathering and conclusions are the steps the scientist takes.

Math and science are two subjects that require two or more years to get into college.

The ability to work with a graphics calculator is required to take the upper level math class such as precalculus and calculus.

But if you think learning the formulas and how to use them is hard, what about teaching the class? Mr. Bill Wood, who teaches geometry, pre-calculus and calculus says that he does not find it very difficult to teach the subject, but the knowledge of the subject can be complicated if you don't know it.

You may also wonder why some

This is the second year for microbiology in which the first semester is spent mostly with bacteria and microorganisms. Microbiology is an ideal class for someone going into the health field.

These classes are designed to develop marketable skills. These skills are not for a specific job, but the flexibility to handle many jobs. The skills that are






















and Brian Matthews drives a '73 Nova.



Actually, Trey Harmon said his dad got him started liking the Wildcats.





What is "in"? How about bell bottoms, ruffled shirts,



We here on the yearbook staff wish these new freshmen the best of luck this year and the rest of they're high school years.






Some students were more concerned with academics. Heather Dragoo and Tammara Taylor said they were worried about not getting enough credits.

There are those students who don't ask much out of high school. The only goal that they wish to achieve is absolutely nothing. Others, only have the desire to graduate.


Of course, some students want to achieve in something

give us a character and shape us into the people we will become.



Now, it's time to wrap up this school year. Everyone is looking on to the future, and as we do, each person is determined to *Take it to the LIMIT!*







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
