




"Reflections"








reaking the pieces, putting them back together...












- Heritage Hills played against Northeast Dubios and it ended very surprisingly. Heritage Hills lost sadly by one point, 59 to 60.































































The 2000 presidential election was in many ways decided by not just the voters but the courts. Five weeks after election day, the US Supreme Court blocked Al Gore's request to have disputed Florida ballots recounted. George W. Bush and Dick Cheney won the election after being awarded Florida's 25 electoral votes.

Antiquated voting methods in this age of technology threw the presidential election into turmoil. Punch card ballots, and the accompanying "Votomatic" system were first created in the 1960s.

Disputed ballots had chads, or paper fragments hanging from the punch card that made it difficult for voting machines to read the ballots.
