Senior Class History

Life in D H S began for us way back in September, 1946--four long years ago. Sixty-two googly-eyed, open-mouthed boys and girls embarked on their career of higher learning. As guides for our perplexed group, we chose two boys and one girl--President, Raymund Altman, Vice President, Wallace Hartley; Secretary-Treasurer, LaVerne Roos. At an early class meeting the officers were elected. President, Jerry Hensley; Vice President, Mary Ann Eble; Secretary, LaVerne Roos; and Treasurer, Joyce Kelley. Our sponsors were: Miss Gabert, Mrs. Kirk, and Mr. Glezen.

During the sophomore year, we again had two parties. One at Lincoln Park, one at Huntingburg Fair Grounds.

By this time, we had learned that laughing at the teachers' jokes made almost as good an impression as studying; so enthusiastic as we were, we resolved ~~not~~ to try to be masterminds, but to have a little fun plus work.

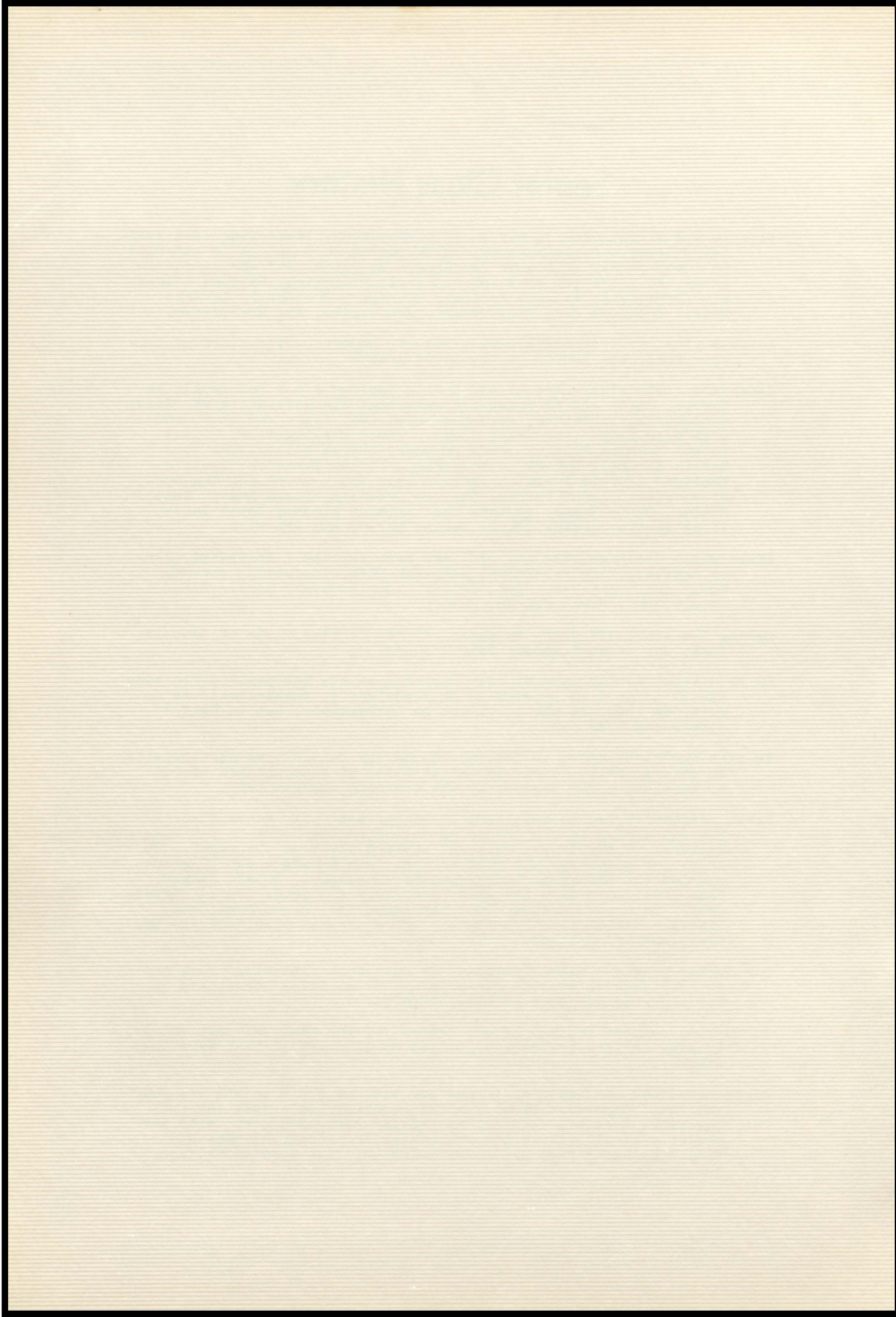
To make ourselves known to the school and the faculty, we participated in several extra-curricular activities; we even managed to contribute two cheer leaders to the cheering student body.

Having weathered two stormy years of school activity, we approached the third ring in our ladder as we opened the doors of D H S as Juniors. Fifty "Jolly Juniors" started the year out right. To start our climb for the year we went into a huddle out of which emerged our officers, Jerry Hensley, President; Leland Ranger, Vice President; Mary Ann Eble, Secretary and Louis Tempel, Treasurer. At a re-election, Bill Livengood was chosen President, and Joan Hunter Vice President. Our sponsors--Miss Weedman, Mr. Rhea, and Mr. Glezen.

Our Junior year was high-lighted by an outing at Evansville Zoo, the Jr.-Sr. Banquet and the Junior play, "Just Ducky" presented under the able guidance of Miss McDaniel.

So, having reached the top of our ladder for the year, we left school, looking forward to being dignified seniors--as if that were possible.

September 1949--and again we opened our book at D H S to add the fourth and final chapter. Shortly after resuming our trials and tribulations (meaning studies) we tallied our class votes with the result that Bill Livengood was chosen President, Clinton Hughes, Vice-President; Mary Ann Eble, Secretary; and Carolyn Whitten, Treasurer.



We still couldn't believe that we were at last Seniors, so trying to convince ourselves of our rank, we ordered our calling cards and announcements.

The last semester we welcomed into our class of '50, Doris Jean Barger of Indianapolis, making the total number of seniors fourtysix.

With our Commencement exercises, we bow out of D H S History. They say "the last mile is the hardest," but under the able leadership of our sponsors, Mrs. Stone, Mr. Woolsey and Mr. Glezen, and with the help of other faculty members, we found our senior year to be the most interesting, exciting chapter of our life in D H S.

Senior Tea

The sophomore Home Ec girls, along with Miss Weedman, sponsored the traditional Senior-Faculty Tea in the Home Ec Room December 21, 1949. While a group of sophomore girls sang "Silent Night" and "Here Comes Santa Claus," we ate our canapes, cookies and favors and drank our punch. Sharon Kaiser recited the poem, "The Night Before Christmas." It was enjoyed and will be remembered by everyone.

The board was beautifully decorated with a picture of baby Jesus and the Three Wise Men. The picture was drawn by Barbara Barnett, sophomore.

Senior Trip

Early Saturday morning, October 8, 1949, forty sleepy-eyed seniors climbed aboard the bus with sponsors, Mrs. Stone, Mr. & Mrs. Glezen, Mr. Bailey and Mr. Pegler and headed for Indiana University. We stopped a while on the way to eat our breakfast and reached the University about 9:00. At 10:00, we were led over the campus on a tour which ended at the cafeteria. Some ate here but others ate elsewhere. The football game between Indiana and Texas Christian started at 1:00 p.m. with Texas Christian winning the game.

Everyone piled into the bus to start on the long trip back home. Again we stopped to eat at Loogootee. At 7:30 we rolled into Dale, glad to be back and agreeing that we had had a very nice senior trip.

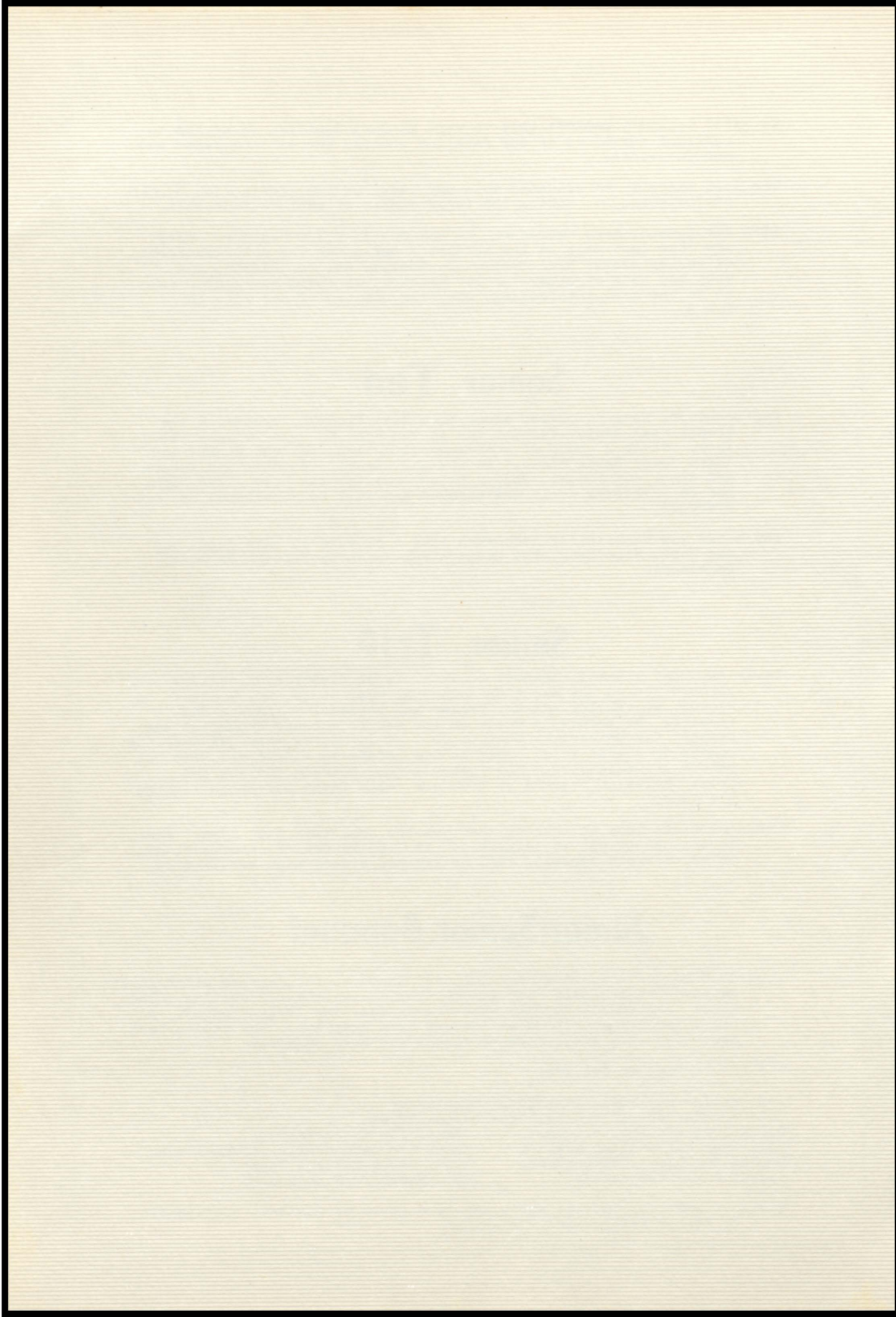
Junior-Senior Banquet

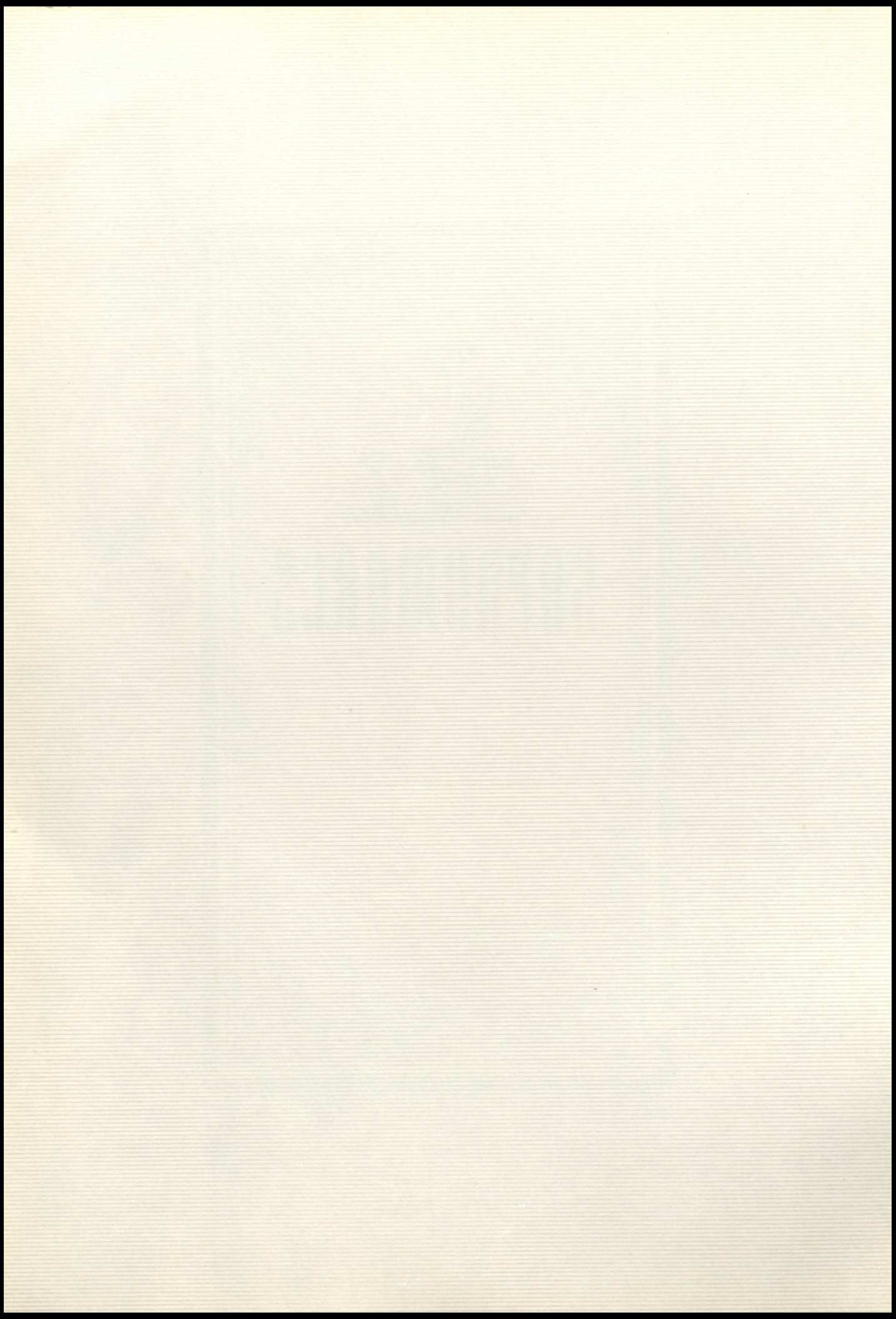

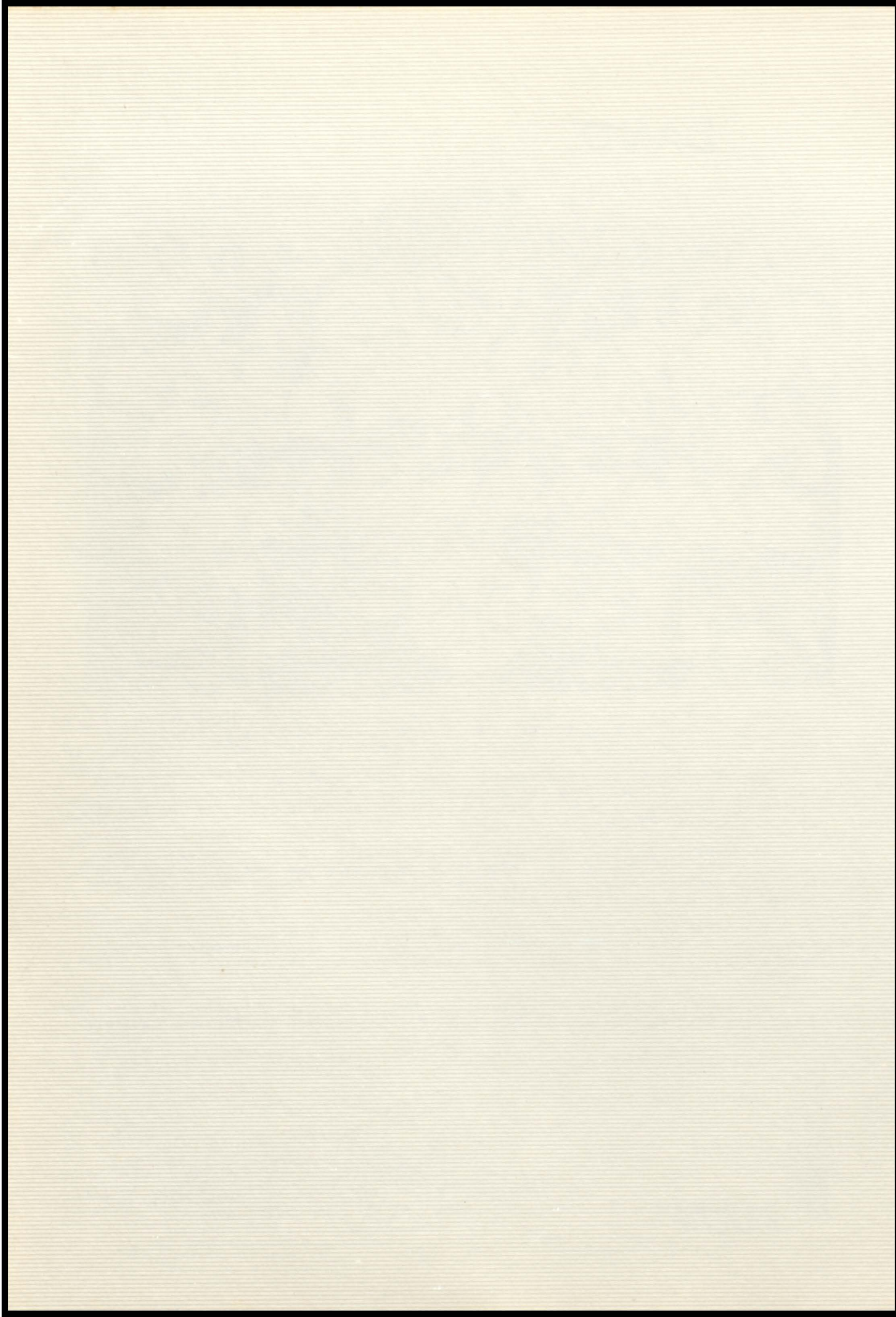
