














"WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE ..."




HERITAGE HILLS FINISHES YEAR
















INJURIES HALT THE PATRIOTS

The Junior Varsity had a victorious season with nine wins and four losses. Coach Hendren said "Without a doubt, Julie Hunter was the most improved."




VOLLEYBALL GIRLS STRUGGLE








RUNNING FOR THE RIBBON

PLACES THIRD IN PAC


Not being fundamentally sound could have been the problem for the Patriots this year. With a 2-11 record, they finished with a commendable third place in the PAC.


















TRIUMPHANT










GOLFERS PUTT THIRD IN PAC
