The freshmen find themselves in a new freedom from the old grade school and home


regulations while the seniors think seriously of colleges, vocations, and military service.

After having a bit of bad luck in the early stages of the season, the Dale Golden Aces rounded into one of the P.A.C.'s best teams, under the very capable leadership of our new coach, Robert Simpson, We made Coach Simpson's debut a most successful one as we rolled over Richland 28-12 in a non-conference tilt. In our first conference game we battled one of the pre-season favorites, Petersburg, to a scoreless tie, for three quarters before falling in the final quarter 23-0. Dale failed to score 7 or 8 times after getting the ball within 10 yards of a touchdown. Oakland City's Acorns spoiled our first home game as the conference charges took another step toward a perfect season bombarding the Aces 47-24. Cannelton's runner-up Bulldogs also took advantage of our early season misfortunes and ran up a 27-6 halftime lead before holding on for a 34-19 win.

On the night of the coronation of Queen Linda Dike, the Aces came from behind, 21-12 at the half time to overpower Richland 34-27, for our first conference victory. This victory started Dale on our drive which brought us from eighth to fifth place in the final P.A.C. standings. In our next outing we almost pulled the upset of the season as we went down fighting against the highly favored Owensville Kickapoos 14-12. We scored a touchdown on the first play of the game to take a 6-0 lead. By halftime we had fallen behind 14-6, but trailed only 14-12 going into the last quarter. Our rampaging Aces got the ball to the 3rd yard line before fumbling with 30 seconds left, ending the exciting game. Dale continued to drive hard as we battled Mt. Vernon to a 6-6 tie at the half. We played even again in the wild last half, finally coming home with a 28-28 tie with the favored Wildcats. The Aces never trailed in this

The climax of the 1956 season came on the last game of the year as the Aces over powered arch rival Rockport to win easily 18-6. Our defense was one of the stoutest in the conference on this night, as the Zebras were held scoreless for three and a half quarters. Rockport's only touchdown came due to a Dale fumble late in the game. Nine seniors thus ended a glorious 4 year high school football career at D.H.S. This final victory proved to be the best of all four seasons. It brought our final record to 3 wins, 4 losses, and 1 tie. HATS OFF TO A GREAT SEASON, A GREAT COACH, AND A GREAT BUNCH OF GUYS!





Harold fights for rebound.




One of our greatest defensive players was HAROLD HUFFMAN who really tormented the players of the opposing team. Playing both forward and guard at times during the season, Harold convinced every one that he can really be all over the floor at one time. A long range bomber, a close-in jump shooter and a hard driver, Huffman added tremendous potential to the Aces' scoring power.

Scoring eighteen points in the game against the Crusaders of Ferdinand, MARK WELLER set the pace for the Aces' third straight victory of the year. Again in the Paoli game it was Mark's three baskets in the first minutes of the game that kept the Aces in front. His determination and scrap were two of the characteristics that earned "Pete" a berth on the Aces starting five.



ROGER KAISER, one of the most prolific scorers in southern Indiana for the past two years and the highest scorer in Dale High School history, had one of his best nights when he scored forty-one points against Chrisney. The scoring expert not only gained the school's single game



record, but he also attained the distinction of owning the best marksmanship display within memory. He whipped in 18 baskets out of 21 tries for a percentage of ,857. His scoring feat became even more astonishing in view of the fact that he played only three quarters.



An outstanding member of last season's freshman team, CARL NEIGHBORS moved into a highly-regarded reserve spot on the Aces team. Neighbors was fast, a good shot, and would really go in to do battle for the rebounds that were needed so badly. With a year of experience behind him, Neighbors will be expected to come through with flying colors during his remaining years with the Aces.

One essential of a good ball team is height, and the Aces had plenty of it in their 6'5" center, LARRY KNOTT. Getting the ball off the bankboards was the chief aim of Larry Knott. (But don't underestimate his shooting power.) Larry pumped in some difficult shots from the corner at the Jasper Holiday Tourney when the Aces were needing points badly. His rebounding and shooting ability proved to be a real asset to the team time and time again during the '56-'57 season.





Although a consistent scorer throughout the year, DANNY GRUNDHOEFER proved himself true to form at Winslow and in the Jasper Holiday Tourney. Hitting seven out of ten shots from the corner at Winslow for a pace of .700 and hitting five out of nine at Jasper for a percentage of .555, Dan proved himself to be the real life-saver in both games. Rebound was another field that "Grundy" specialized in. He was always right there to fight for a rebound everytime that a shot was made.

Another guy who supplied the Aces with much needed reserve power was DAVID KNOTT. David was a deadly shot from the center of the floor. He cemented the final scores in the Silver Creek and Owensville games by sinking shots from the middle of the floor just as the gun sounded. He proved himself as a great asset to the team time and time again during his high school career.



BOB REINHART, a senior guard who doubled as an outstanding point-maker and the team's play-maker helped make Dale's season successful. Although Rheinie was not always in the high points scoring wise, it was his brilliant play making tactics



and his great leadership ability that led the Aces onward. Bob had speed, could rebound with the best and had a "magnetic" eye which seemed to draw his shots through the basket.



BILL BOCKSTAHLER was a 6'4" junior forward who supplied the Aces with much needed reserve strengh. Filling in when Larry Knott was sidelined with an injured ankle, "Buck" really boosted the Aces along in the Petersburg game, which was the big P.A.C. game of the year. Although Bill was a good steady player all year 'round, it seemed that all through his career he always played his best game against our intra-county rivals, Rockport.

MARVIN GRUNDHOEFER, a rough and rugged member of the Dueces, supplied good bench strength for the Aces. Marv was fast, was a good shooter, and could really go in for the rebounds. Although he drew four fouls in the Richland game, his defensive tactics were really great. Marvin, no doubt, will be called upon a great deal next year to carry the Aces onward.

Although they were not members of the first ten, AMOS LAMAR, a freshman, and DAVID KEMP and TOM SCALES, sophomores, boosted the Aces a great deal. These players were always ready and willing to play whenever they were called upon to help. They really deserve plaudits because of their ever-readiness and their desire to play basketball with the Aces.

ACES DEFEAT TELL CITY IN TRIPLE OVERTIME TO GAIN SECTIONAL CROWN


Bob Reinhart hit a layup in the third overtime to give the Aces a 40-38 victory over Tell City.
