



TO THE STUDENTS OF DALE HIGH SCHOOL:


Dale High School faces the future with hope, courage and confidence.





AGRICULTURE

Vocational Agriculture is a subject for boys who wish to have farming as their occupation. The chief objective of Vocational Agriculture is to teach boys better farming methods and better farm management so as to succeed in their occupation. Records are an important factor in farming so records are kept on several livestock and crop projects by each pupil each year so students may learn how to keep records later on in life.

In 1953, there were 37 boys enrolled in Agriculture.



ENGLISH

The purpose of homemaking in the schools is to help the individual live a more useful and satisfying personal, family and community life. Years ago the curriculum of homemaking education meant only cooking and sewing. Not it includes courses in the following areas of education:

- Selection, preparing and serving of food.
- Selection, care, renovation and construction of clothing.
- 3. Guidance and care of children.

- 5. Home care of sick, including first aid.
- Maintenance of human and family relationships.




SOCIAL STUDIES

Under the supervision of the Band Booster Club the Band has a full-time summer program, during which they gave three free outdoor concerts.


GIRL'S PHYSICAL ED.





We have endeavored to elevate this department to a place where our girls have attained such perfection in the various activities that they are able to place before the public a program that is both instructive and entertaining.






ACES 36; CANNELTON 14


Showing the same scoring punch but improved tackling, the Aces belted the Cannelton Bulldogs 36-14. It was the Aces all the way, as Crews ran wild scoring four touchdowns, Hedges and Creulich also scored for the Aces.

ACES 22; TELL CITY 22

The Dale Aces playing a very poor brand of football in the first half, rallied in the last half to gain a 22-22 tie with the slightly favored Marksmen of Tell City. Tell City was leading at the half 22-8. In the last half Hedges scored 2 touchdowns and had a dropkick for the tying margin.

ACES 38; OWENSVILLE 20

Playing good football the Aces trounced the Owensville Kickapoos 38-20 on the Owensville Gridiron. Featuring line plunging and strong downfield blocking the Dale team ran up a 20-0 score at the half. Hedges again was the scoring leader. Crews also scored in the last half.



FOOTBALL

The Dale Aces closed a very successful 1952 season by winning the second Pocket Athletic Conference Championship in D. H. S. history. The season record of the black and gold was a very impressive 7-1-1. After an early season defeat and tie, the Aces won 6 straight games under the expert coaching of Dutch Bailey who had his first successful season in four years of Coaching in D. H. S.



ACES 38; PETERSBURG 6

The Dale Aces played what was probably their best game of the season in trouncing the Petersburg Indians 38-6. The ends showed remarkable defensive improvement and were big factors in holding the Indians to one touchdown. Hedges scored three times and LeRoy had two touchdowns and a dropkick for the Aces.

ACES 54; RICHLAND 19

The Dale Aces, although being held to a 12-6 halftime lead blasted the Richland Red Devils 54-19. The small but tricky Devils surprised the Aces but couldn't keep pace with the strong Aces in the last half. Hedges scored 4 times, LeRoy 3, Lehrl, and Huffman had 6 points on 3 dropkicks.

ACES 72; CHRISNEY 6

In what proved the largest total number of points scored by one time in the Conference this year the Aces blasted Chrisney 72-6. Hedges scored 6 touchdowns, Crews 2, Hunter, LeRoy and Suhrheinrich each had one in this runaway game. Roos, Sergesketter and Truelove showed strong defensive ability in the Contest. Huffman again added 3 drop kicks for 6 points.

After the Acorns had taken a 13-12 lead in the first half, Hedges heaved a desperation pass of 60 yards which was completed to LeRoy to give Dale an 18-13 lead which was never challenged. In the last half, the Aces held the Acorns scoreless while Hunter and Hedges scored.

KIWANIS AWARD WINNER


BOOSTER CLUB


"JUNE GRADUATE"
