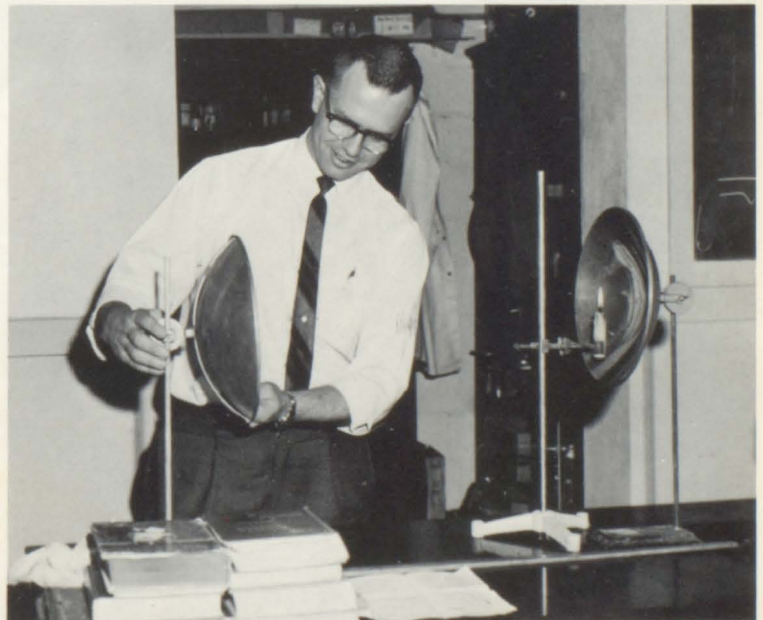

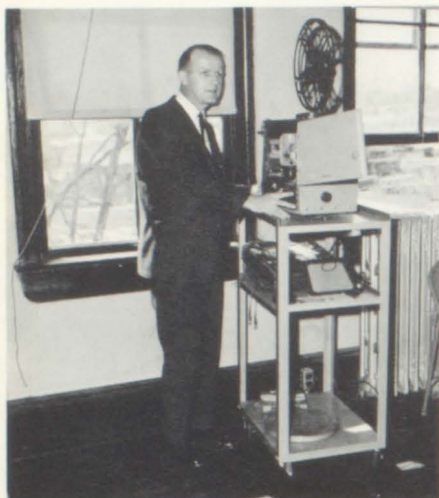

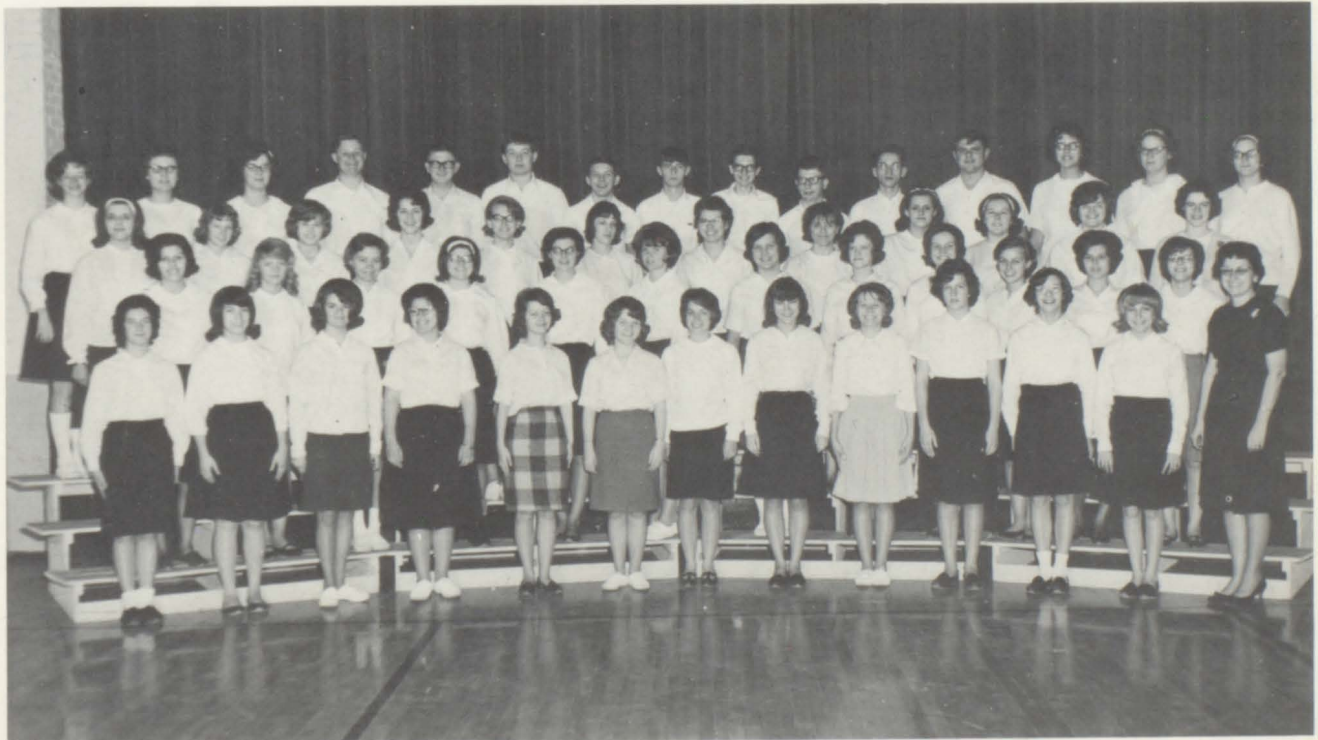

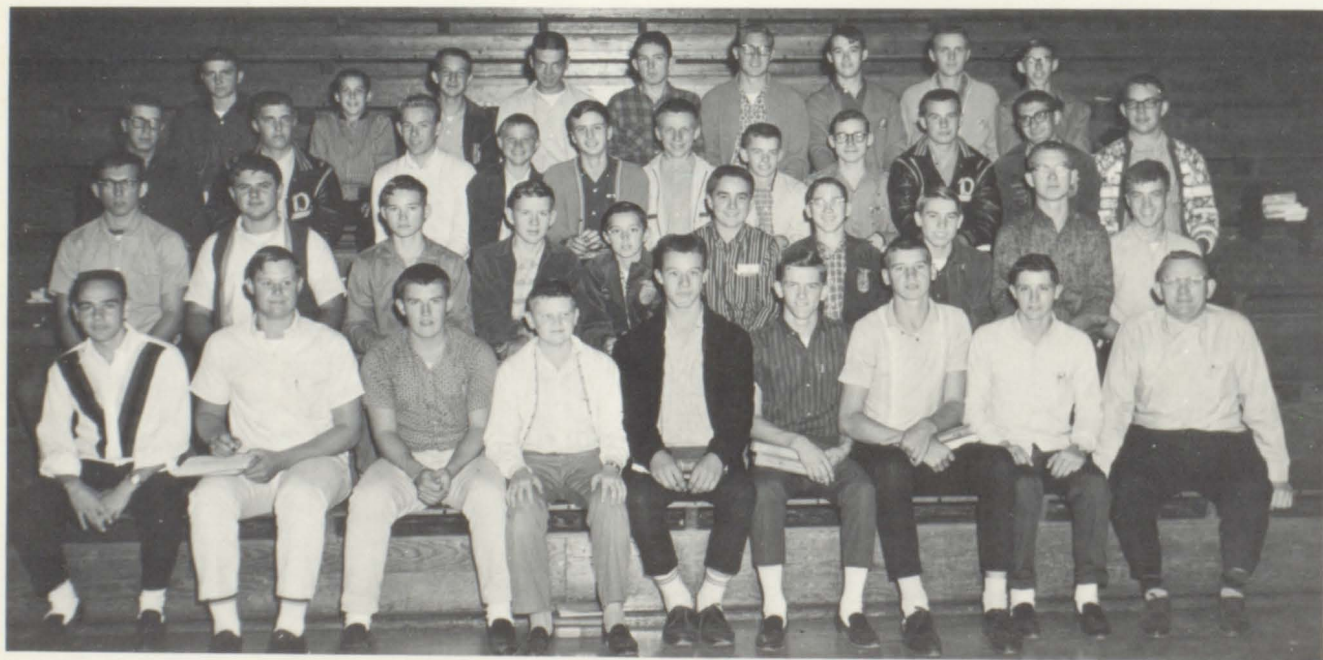


FHA

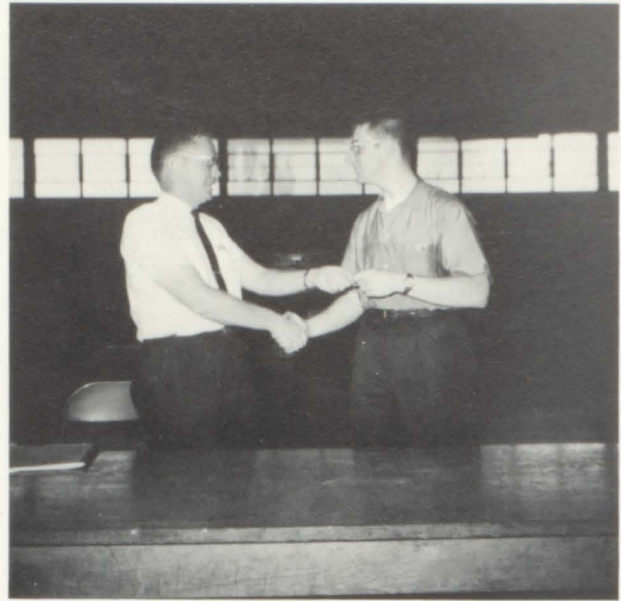

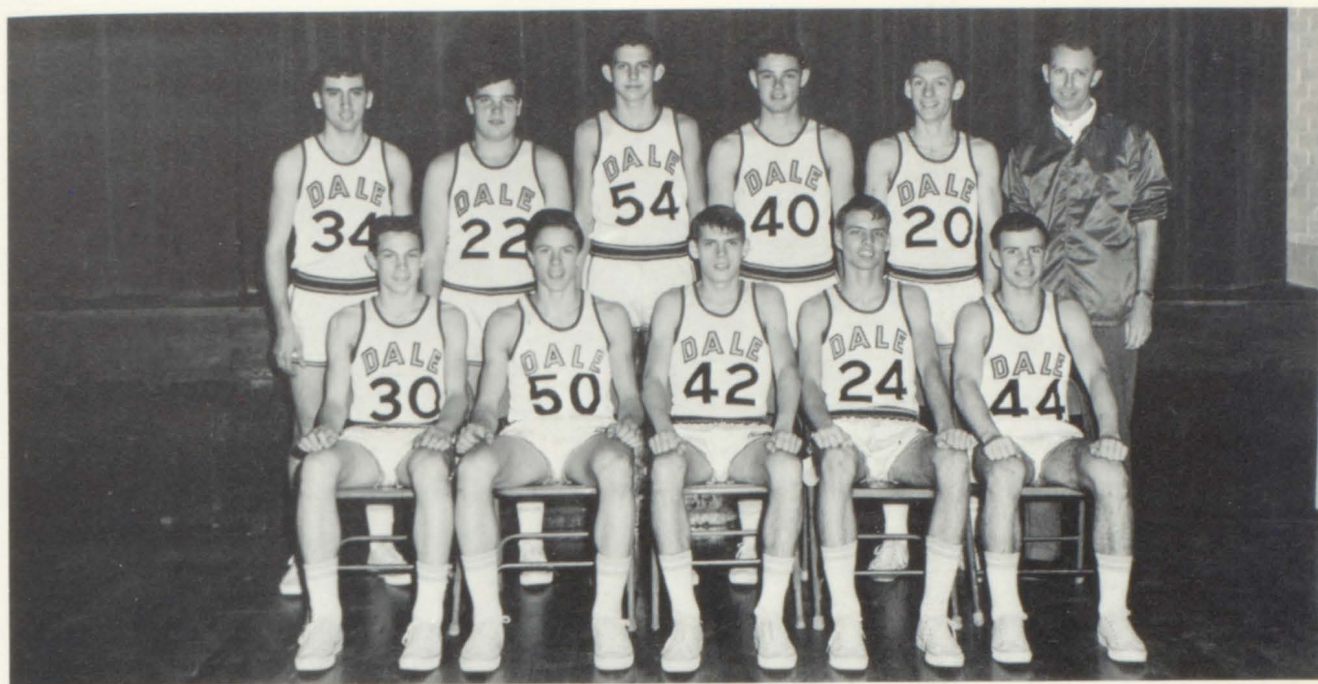

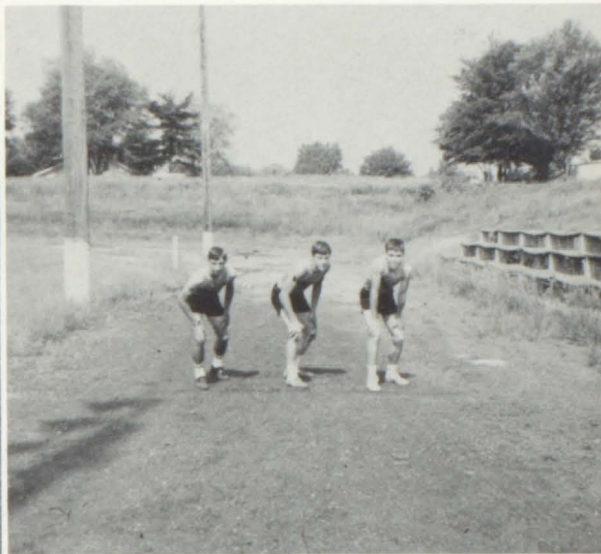

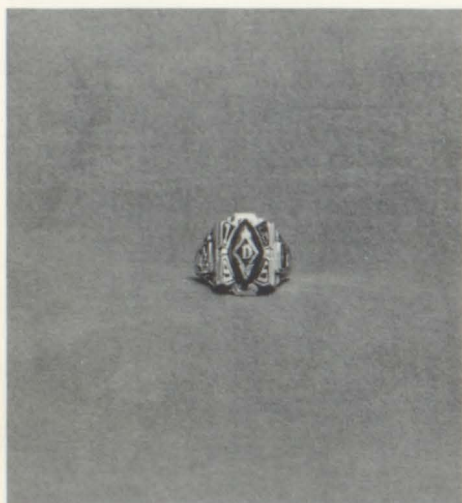
