
Another advantage of a small school is the security it affords us; it is a safe haven. Instead of students bringing guns and knives to class, we bring gum and cards.

When we get in trouble for bringing these petty things to school it seems somewhat ridiculous, but even though we complain we know we have the best of all worlds.


Our community believes in strong school discipline, which means teachers and parents are to be held in respect.

This allows students to let it all out without getting into trouble and feeling like an idiot.










Without this organization many individuals would still feel alone in dealing with their problems.

This was the first year Peer Facilitators attendedbthe World Pride Drug Conference in Indianapolis.







Crownings took place between games. Prince and Princess were Andy Parsley and Julie Street. King and Queen were Aaron Wilson and Jodi Olds.









Thousands of dollars of prizes were given away at the auction.






The spelling team coached by Mrs. Jeanne Logsdon was the school's other academic team. The team traveled to Paoli for the regional, where they were eliminated in the first round.

They arranged having a T-shirt made for club members to wear to games. The blue shirts were lettered in red and white and said REBEL THUNDER across the front.


As basketball season progressed the Pep Club seemed to become more spirited and by tournament time they became quite a boisterous group.







Students can earn as much as twelve hours of college credit before graduation.



When the powerful people on the college admitting teams start to go over transcripts, they carefully count how many sections of science and math a student has taken.

Just taking the state minimum in science and math doesn't impress these people. For instance Indiana University doesn't want to consider a student unless he or she is taking a strong academic load his or her senior year.

I.U. and Purdue prefer that students take at least four years of high school math. We now offer students the option of taking up to five years of math, since algebra is available at the middle school level and calculus students take the advanced placement test in the spring, which allows them to earn college credit before they leave high school.

In the past five years South Spencer has upgraded its math and science curriculum. Consequently, many improvements in student achievement have resulted. National test scores, such as the S.A.T. have gone up. Students are earning advanced placement credit and are better prepared for college.

Our school may be small, but it offers a math and science curriculum which would be competitive with that found in a high school four times the size.

We are one of the first high schools in the state to have offered advanced placement biology. The course is rigorous by anyone's standards, but it continues to thrive.


Not all the math and science courses are upper level college prep. General courses still hold an important spot in the curriculum.


Next year an ecology class will be offered by the science department. The initial response for the class has been quite favorable. The overall aim of the department is to meet the needs of the variety of students we have.



Industrial arts teachers from all over the state of Indiana have visited South Spencer to obtain ideas about how to update technology areas in their schools.



It seems that every year there are those same students who refuse to participate in P.E. Sometimes students actually can't graduate, because they refuse to pass P.E.



On the days the P.E. students aren't lifting they get to play games or go swimming.



For the second year the English department produced a literary magazine comprised of student poetry and photography.



Some believe the G.P.A. requirement for qualification should be based on the results of grades after the first five grading periods, rather than after just the first three.







When Ms. York assigned everyone to write, produce, and star in their own commercial some students approached the project with dread, but some accepted it with a challenge.


Evan Young could always



Chris Kinder both went to a Van Halen concert.



resembled a sheep dog with static on a bad hair day. Andrew Driskell claims when he has a bad hair day he looks like Albert Einstein!







Fears were not only of the upperclassman, but also of the changes that had to be made to adjust to high


