


Memories . . . of Patriot Pride










Pride in Athletic Success


"Pomp and Circumstance"



The last part of the trip was spent on the beautiful island of Cozumel, where they swam, sunbathed, and explored.





Cross Country Runs For More Wins







Out of a smashing team, eight girls received letters, four of which are returning next season. The girls all agreed that with much effort they definitely accomplished their goal of beating last year's record.




Boys' Tennis Reaches Semifinals




J.V. Tennis Goes Undefeated












