
The word



Students blended creativity with hard work to excell in band and art. Numerous awards were won.







We Were Busy But Prepared







Marching Patriots started out with a slow year, but they worked to make this year the best.


Band consisted of twenty-four seniors, twenty juniors, nineteen sophomores, and thirty freshmen. They also marched five eighth graders.








Journalism Produces Quality Newspaper





Students Against Drunk Driving



Flags Fly in Hoosier Dome



Blood Drive a Success



Anne Hommik from Sweden stayed ten months. She will study science in college.








Cleland Qualifies for Semi-State










Netters Win Most Matches Ever



J.V. Finishes Excellent Season










