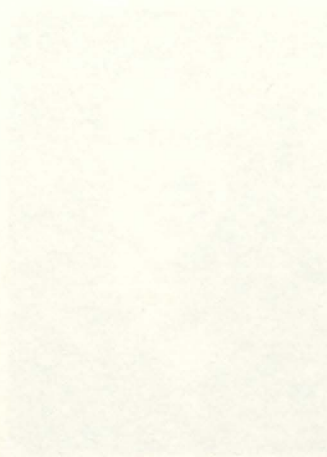
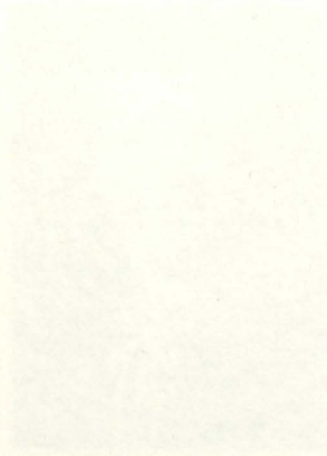
The Senior's presented their class play, "The Tin Hero", under the direction of Mrs. Josephine Stone on March 29 and 30, 1951.

## SENIOR TRIP

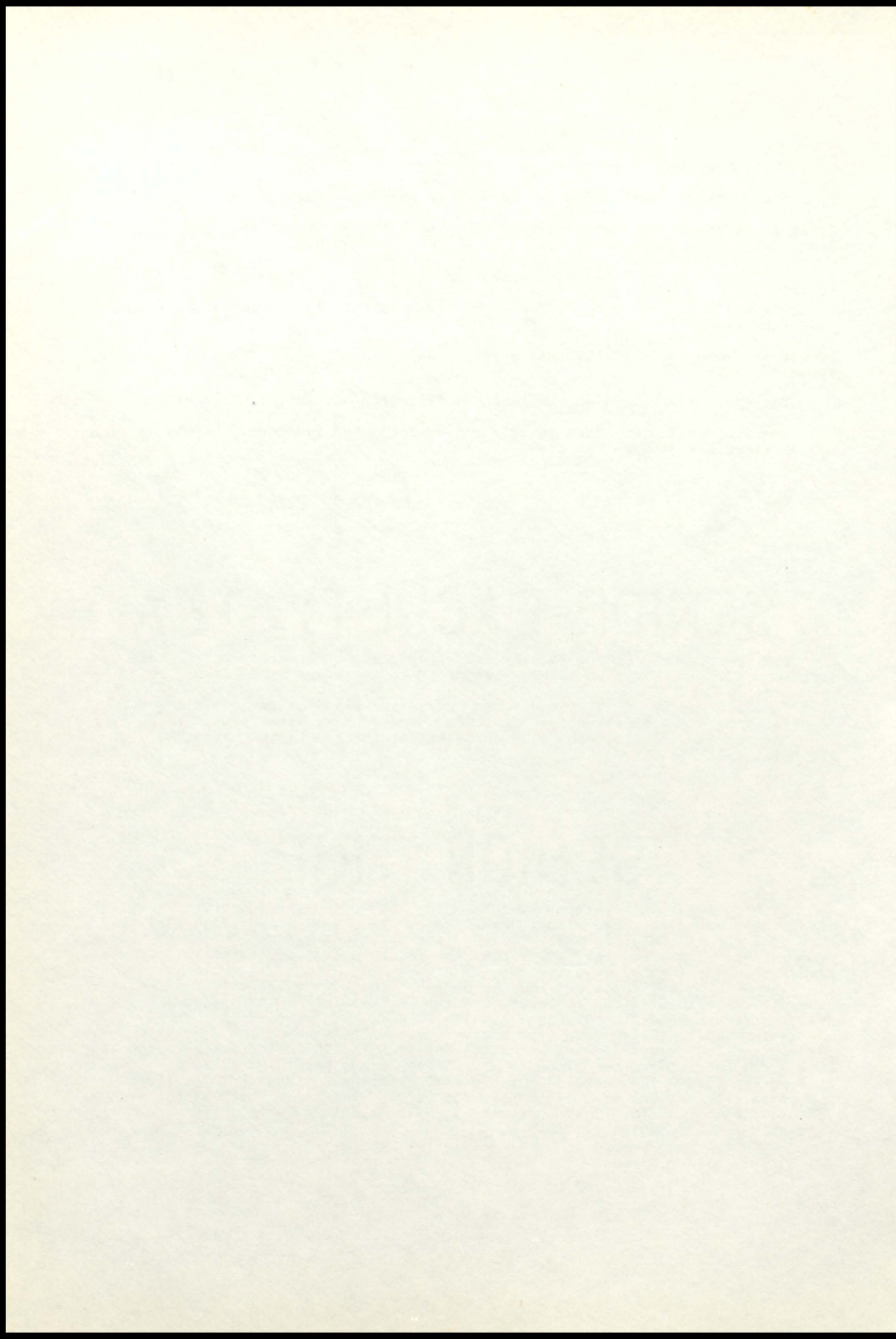

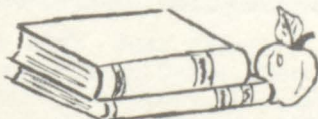
The grade basketball team, through some unknown source, has this season of '50-'51 acquired the name of "Rockets."

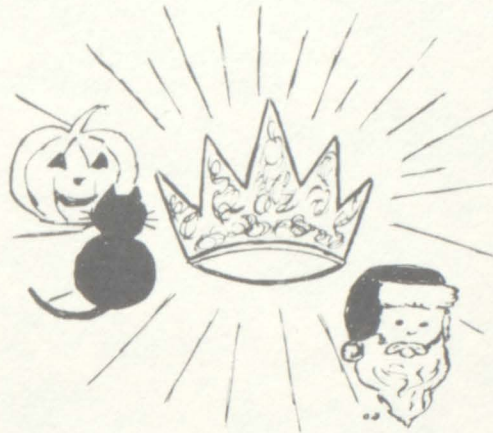
# FESTIVAL QUEENS
