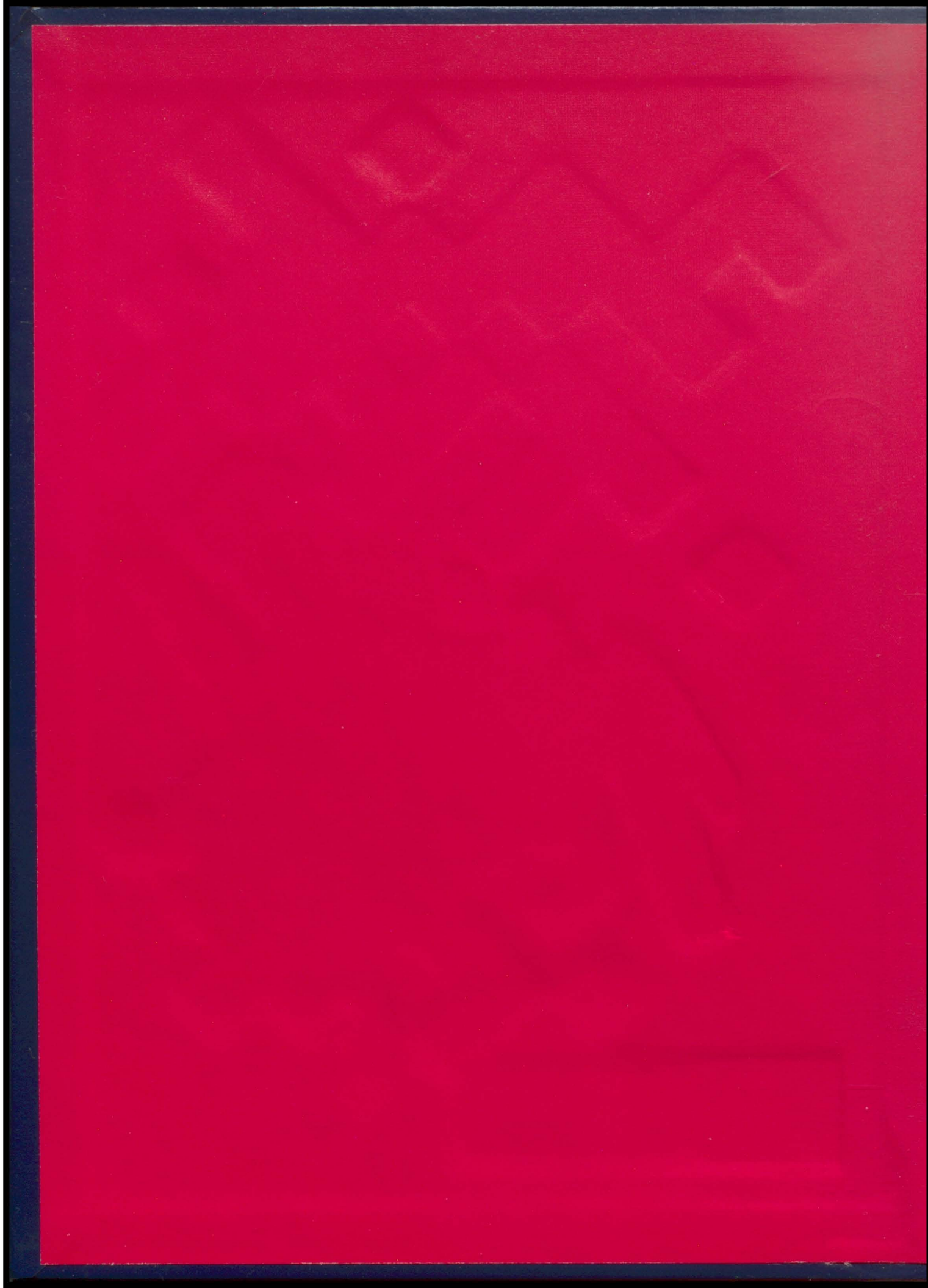


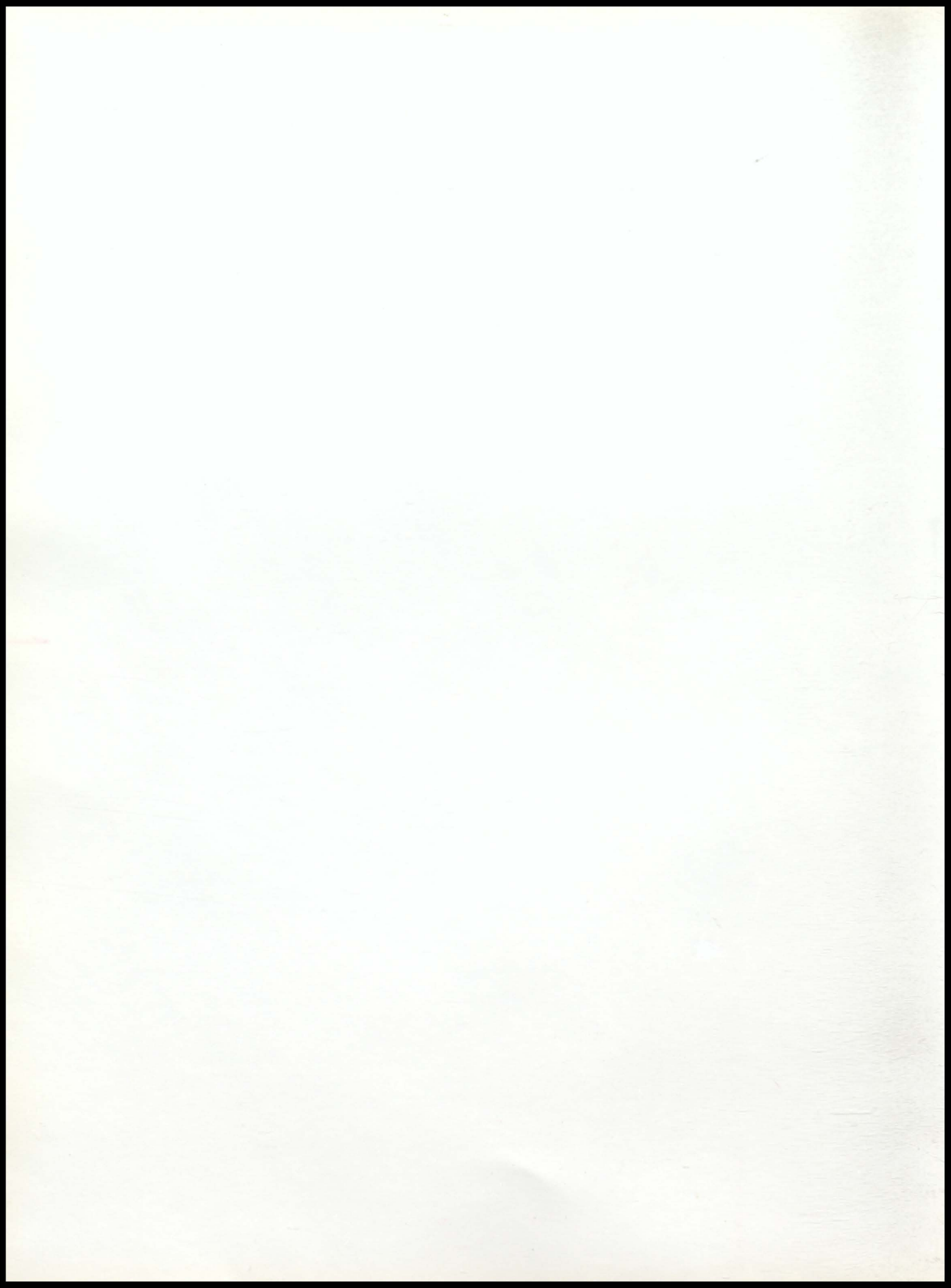

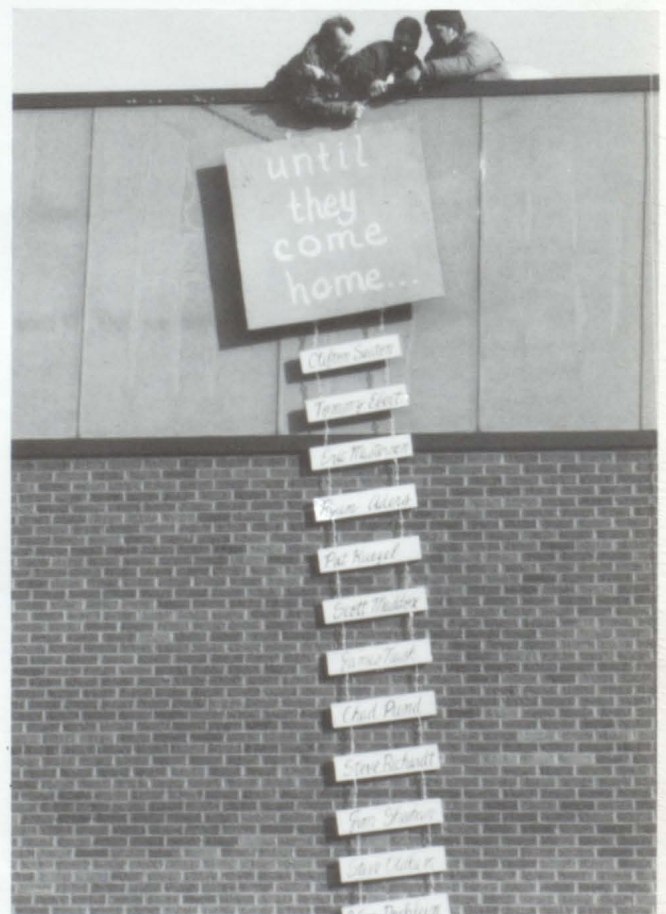

improve the environment.

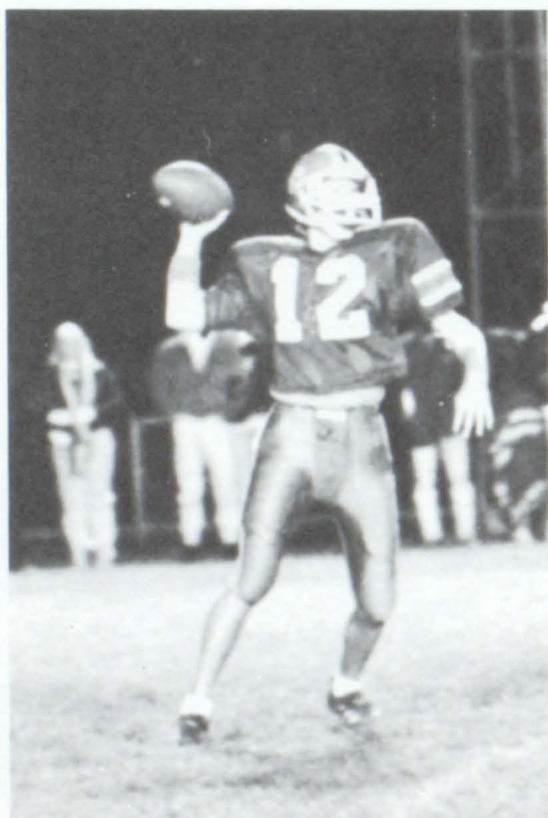

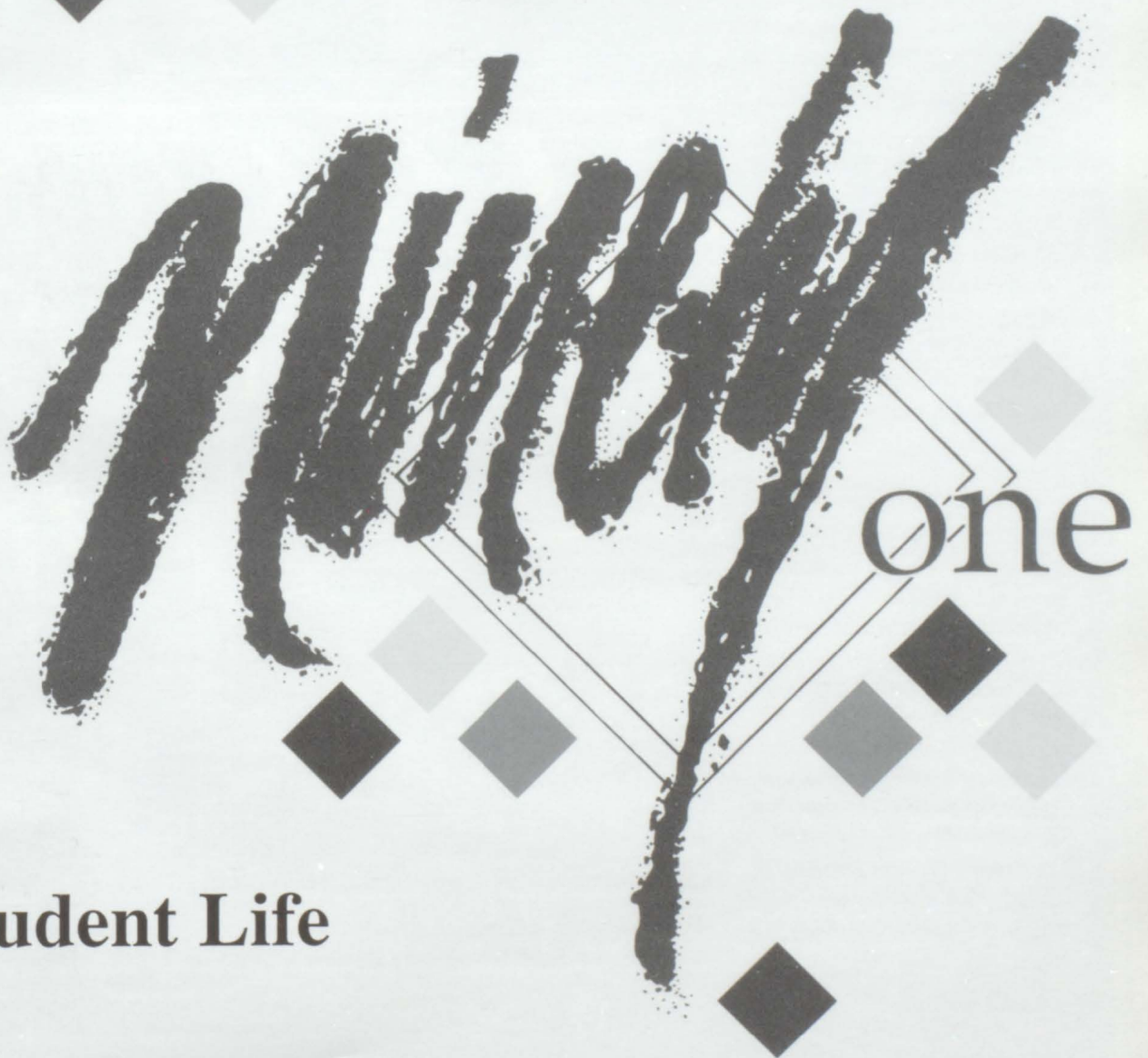

Marching Band Places Ninth in State



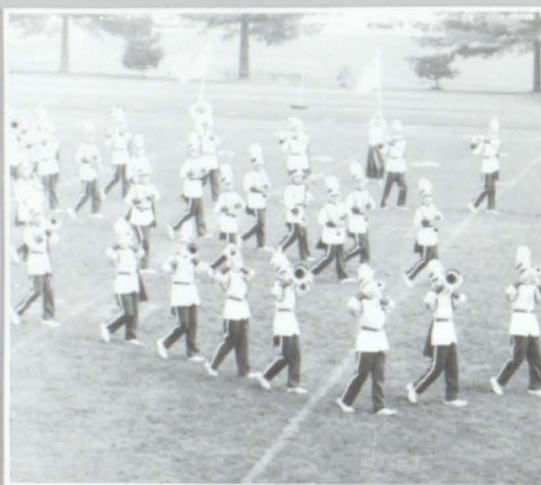

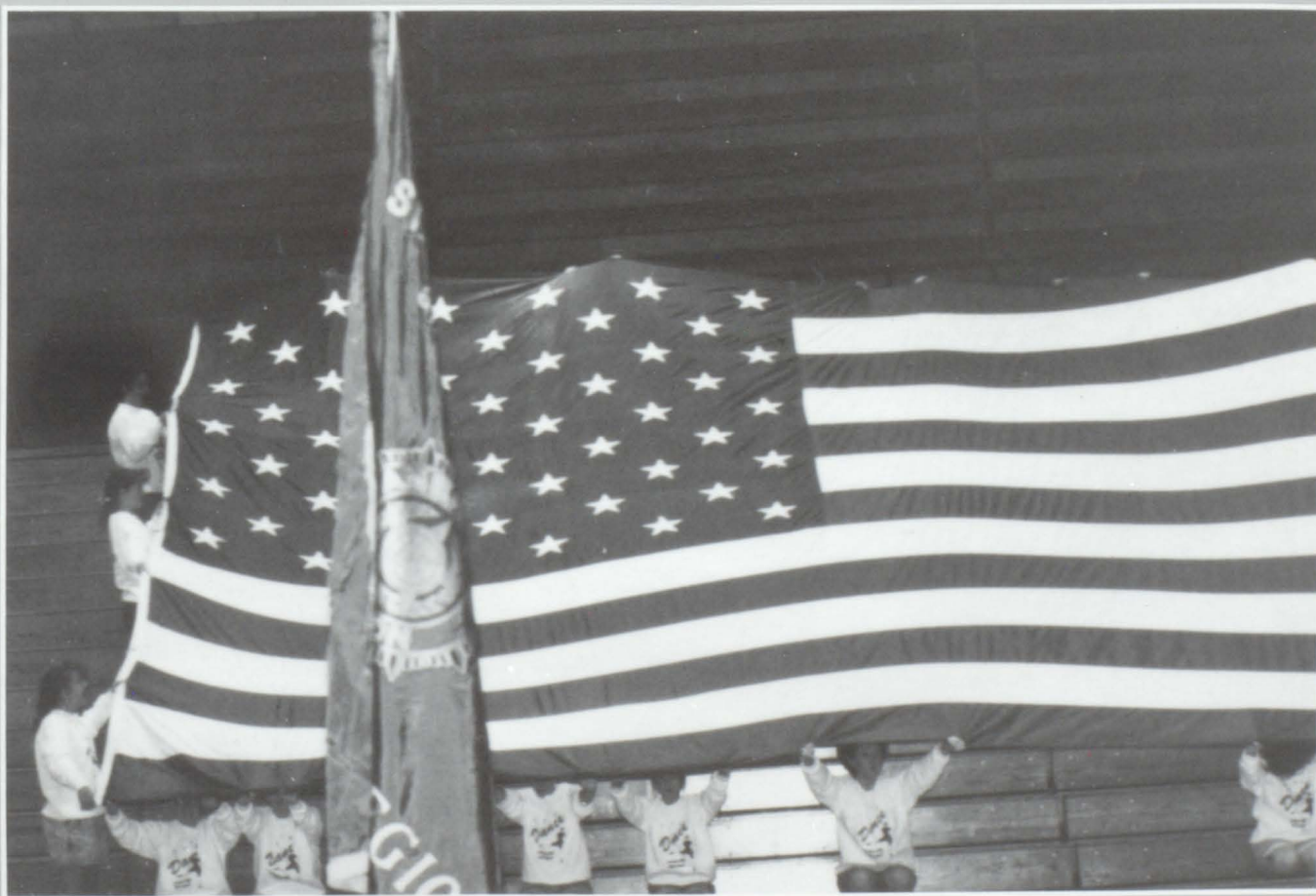




Convocations Provide Entertainment

Students Have Heavenly Time at Prom

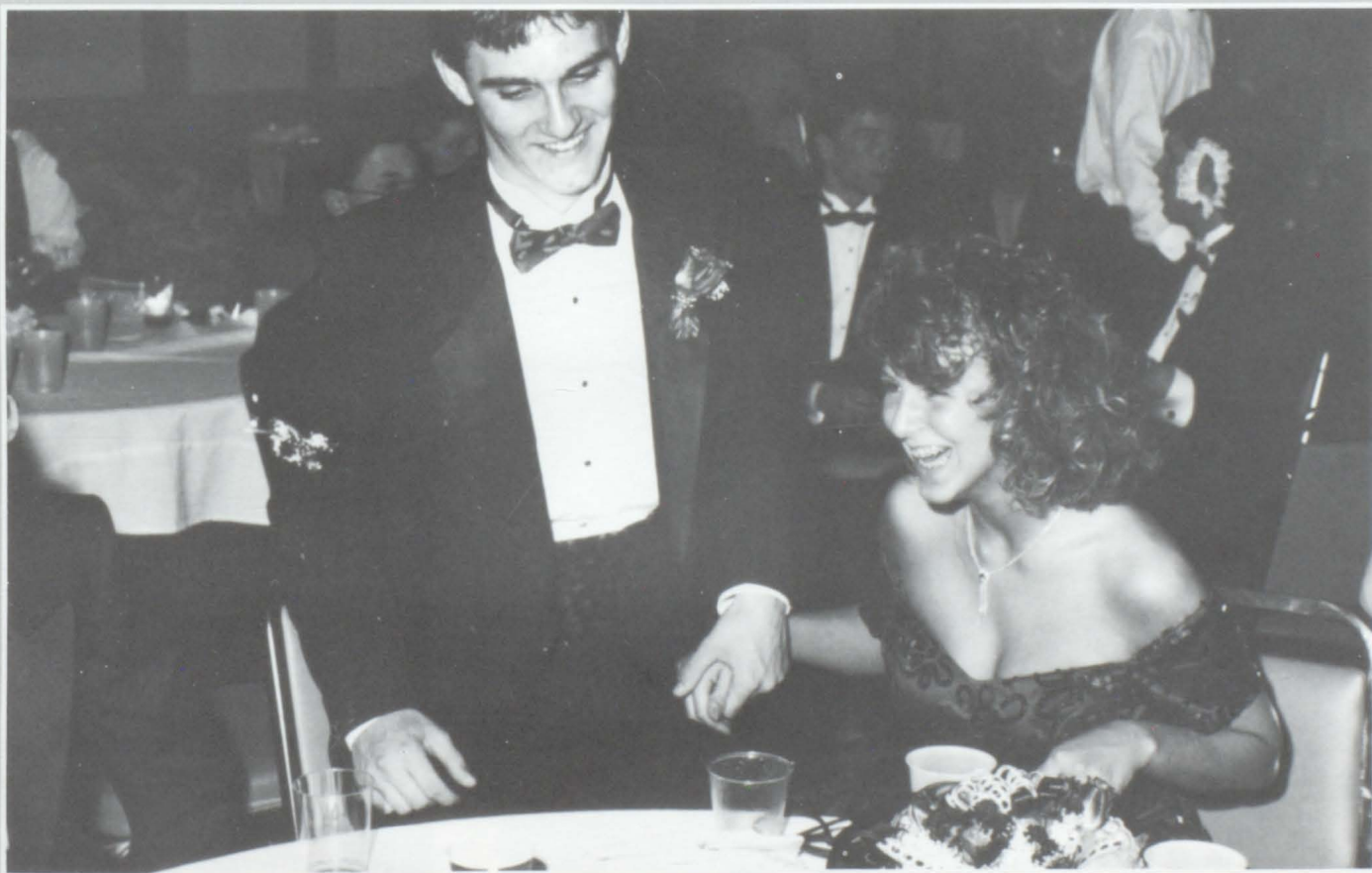

Variety: The Spice of Student Life

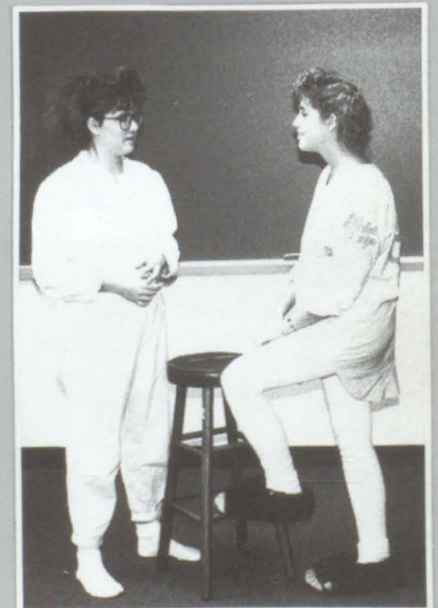
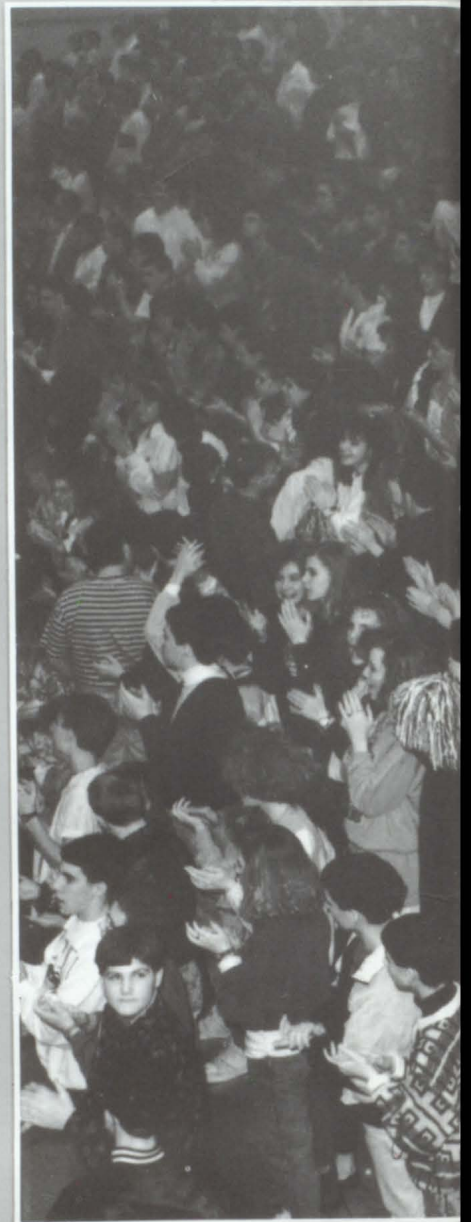

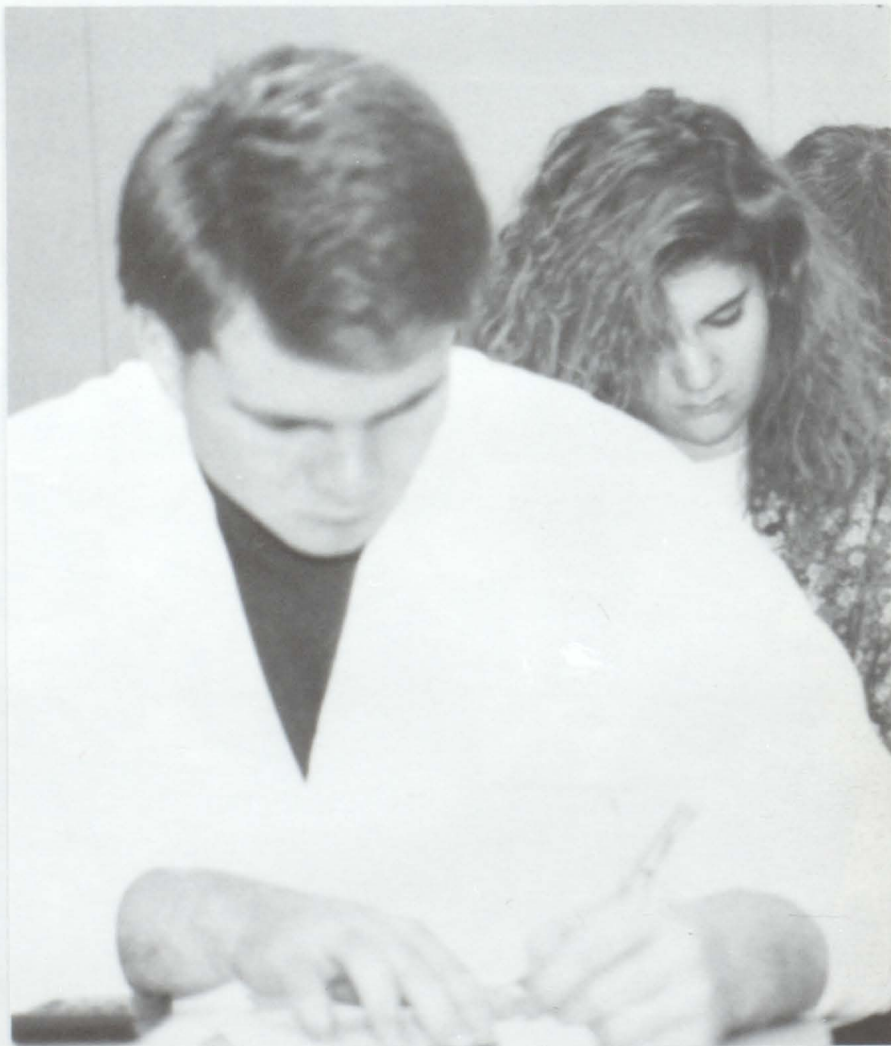

Social Studies Department

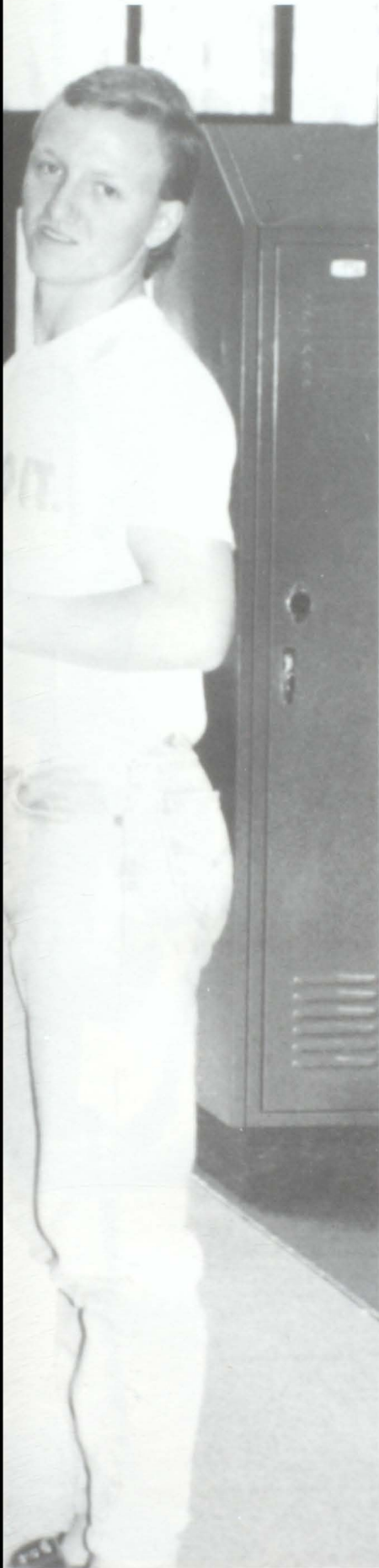

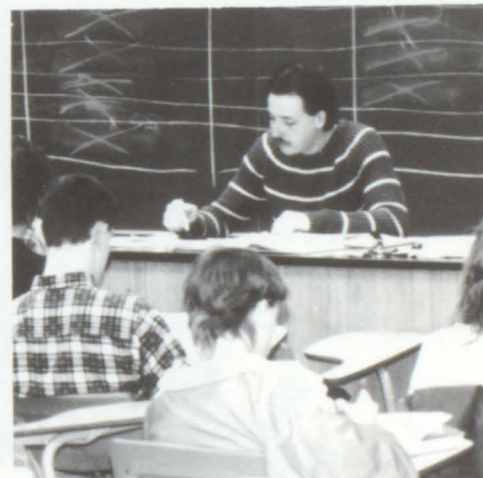

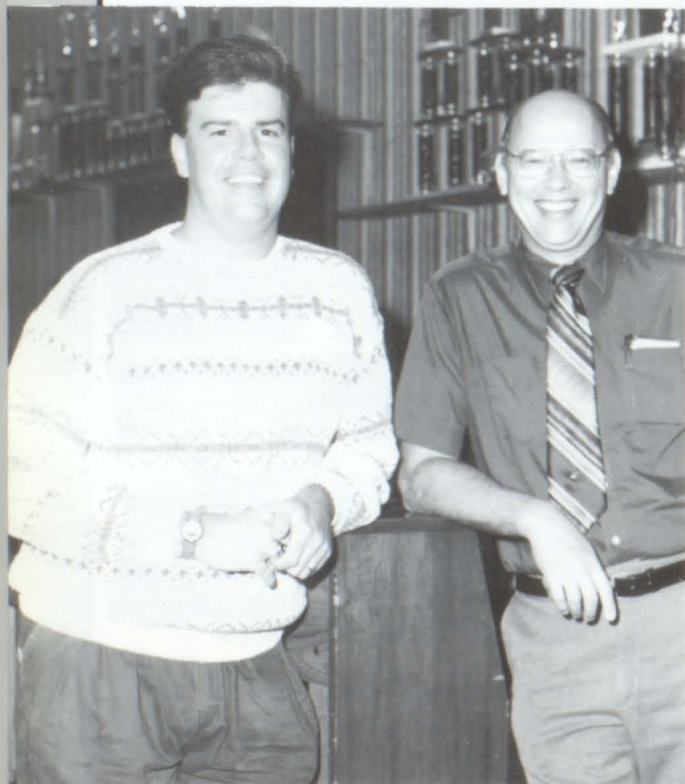

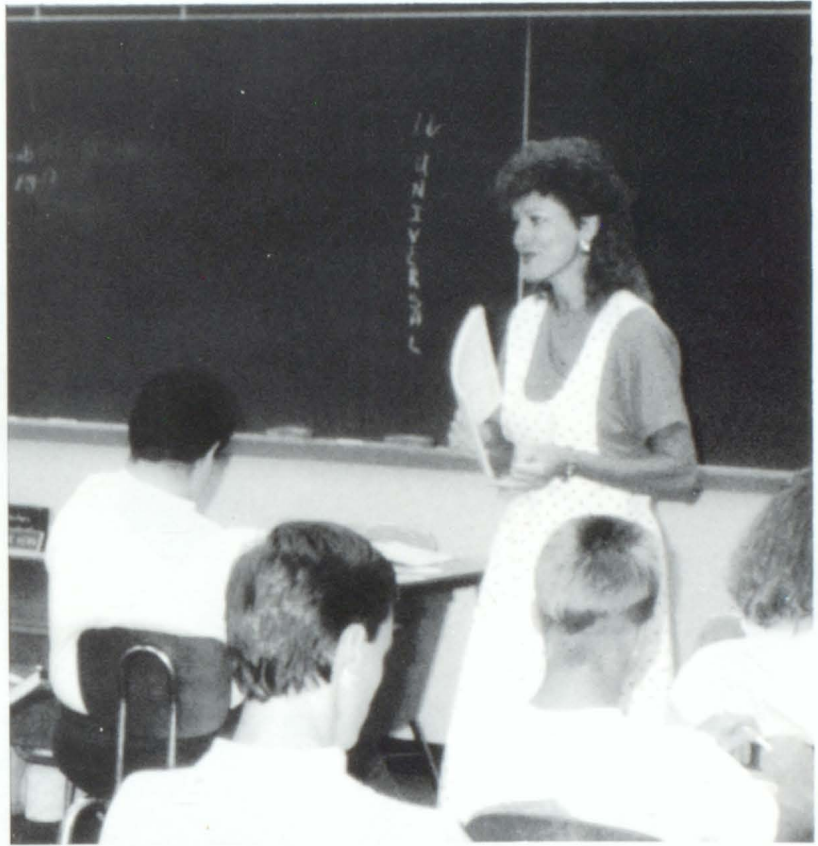

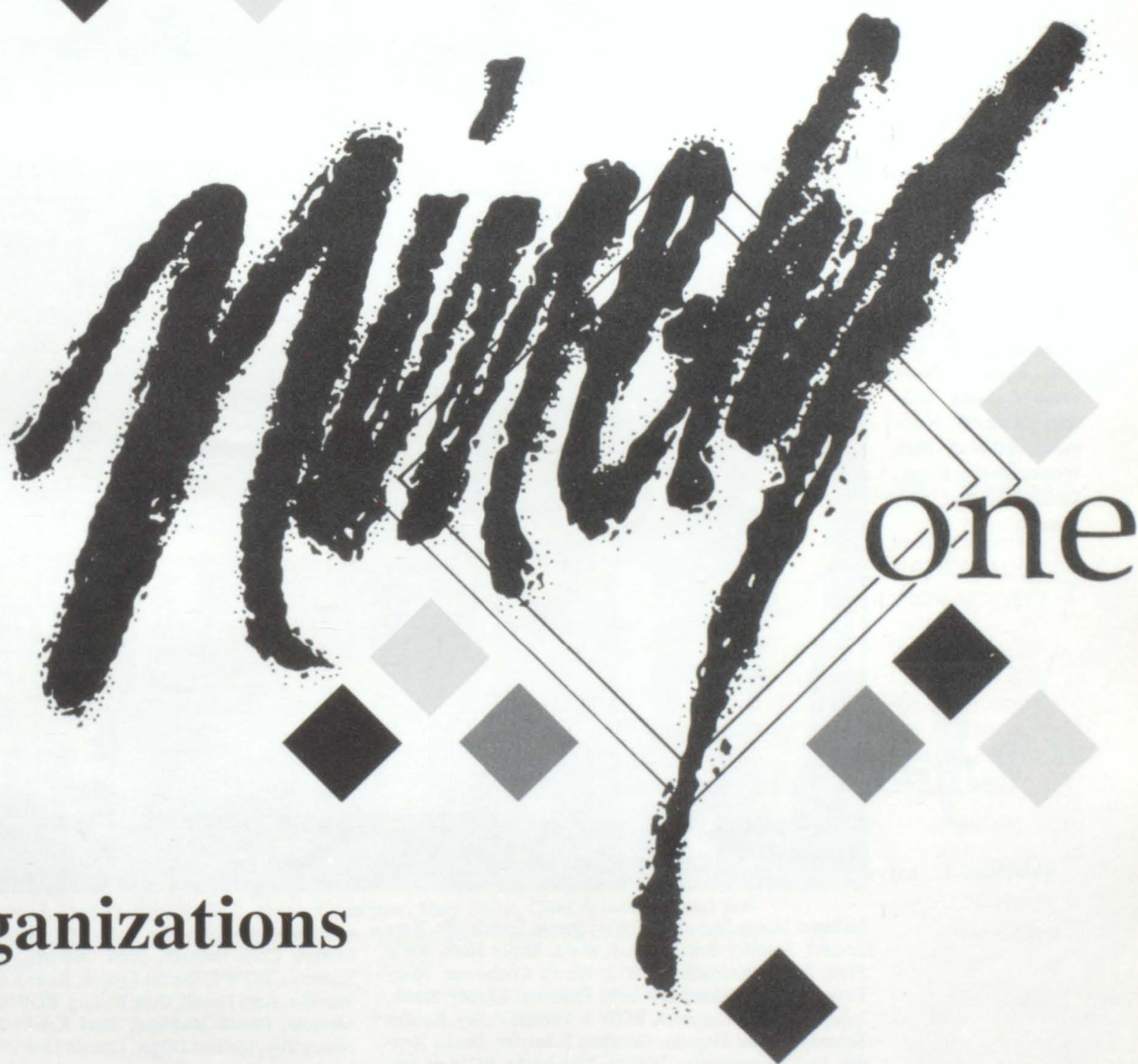

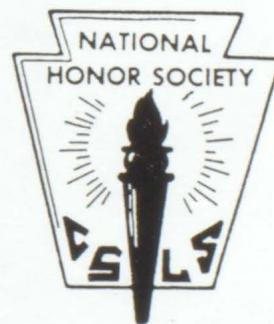

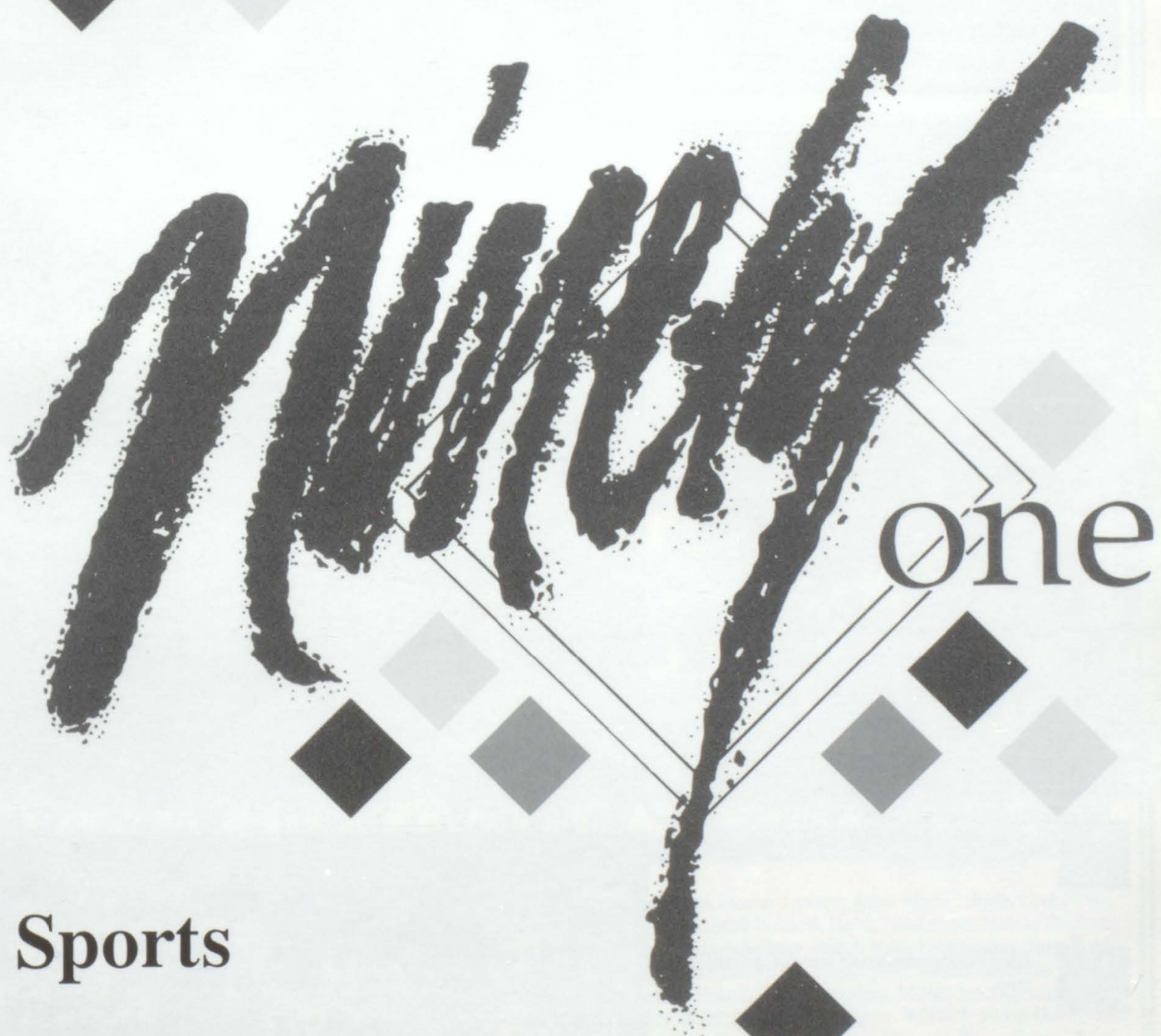

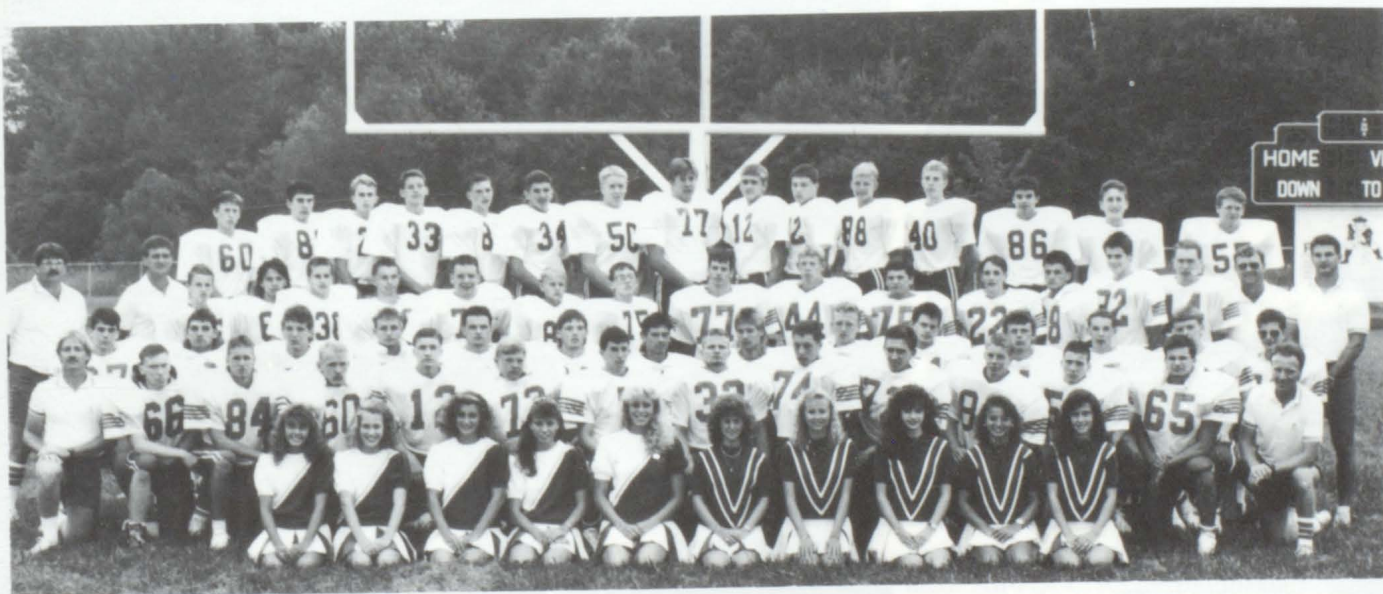
Patriots Work for Strong Season

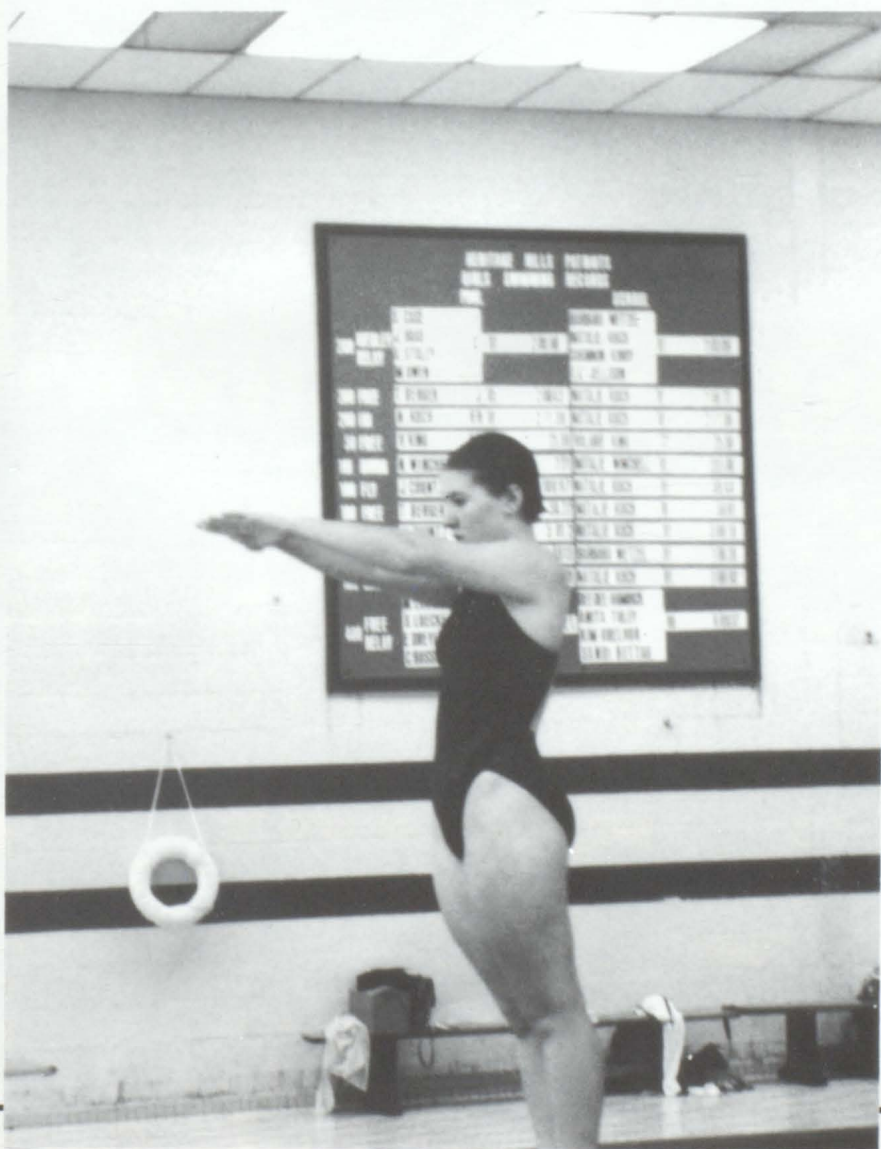

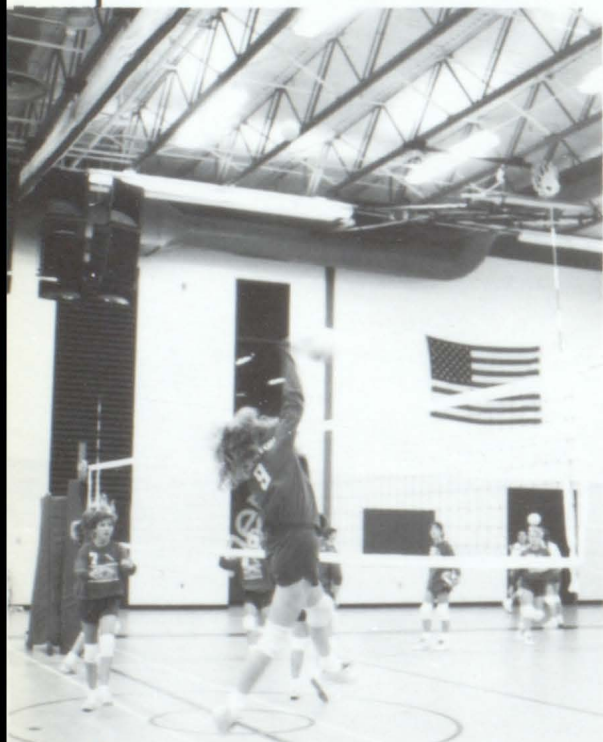

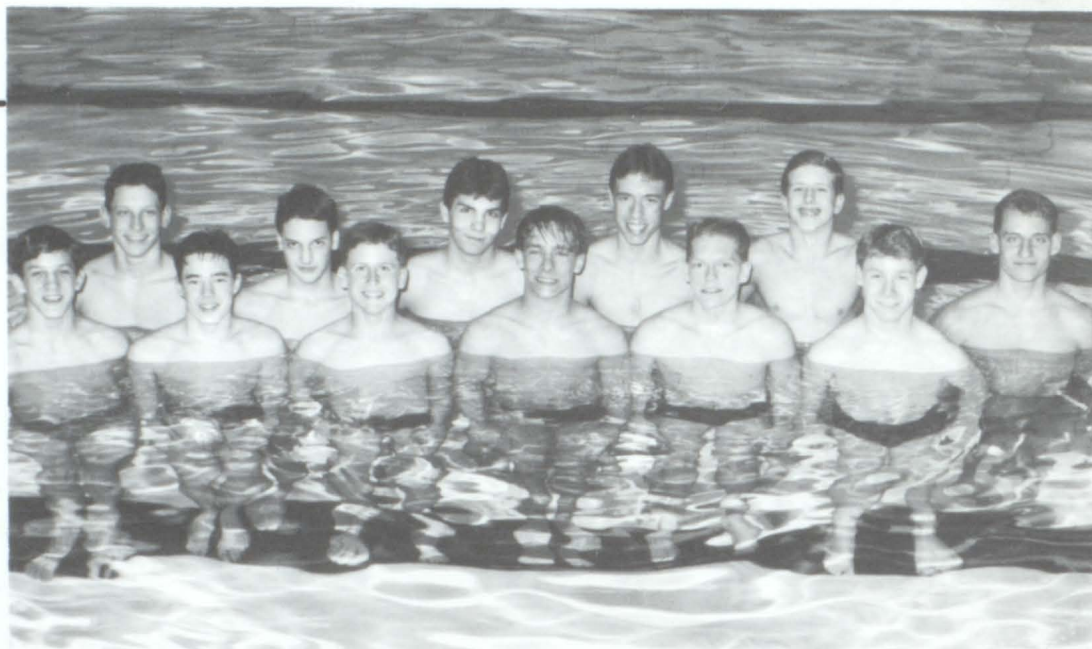

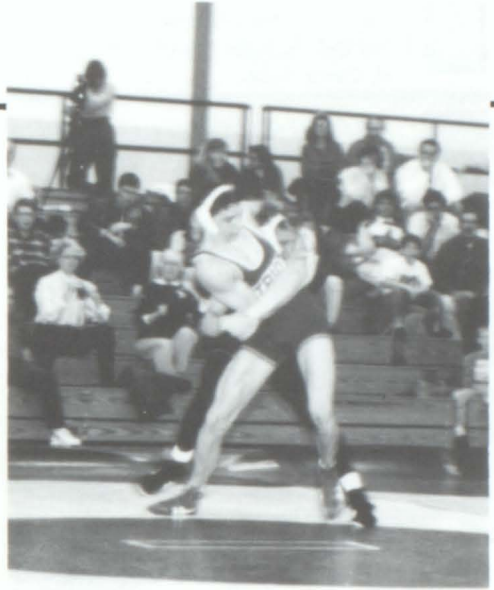

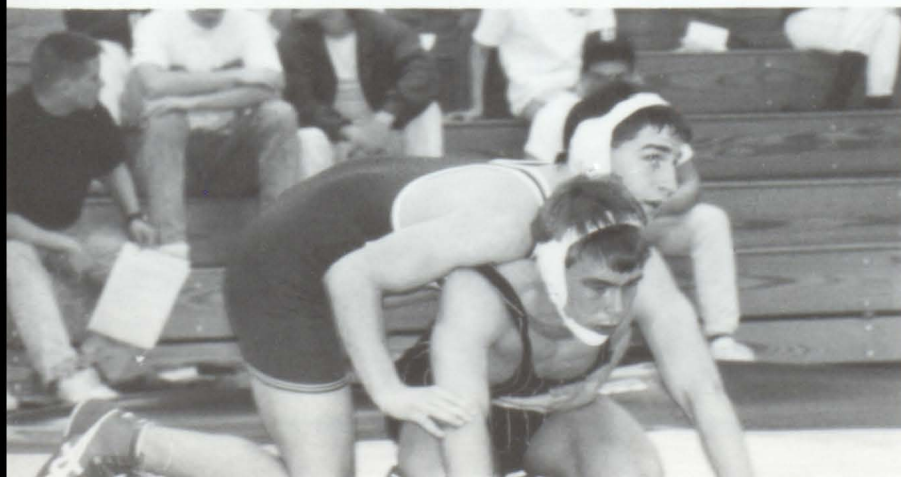

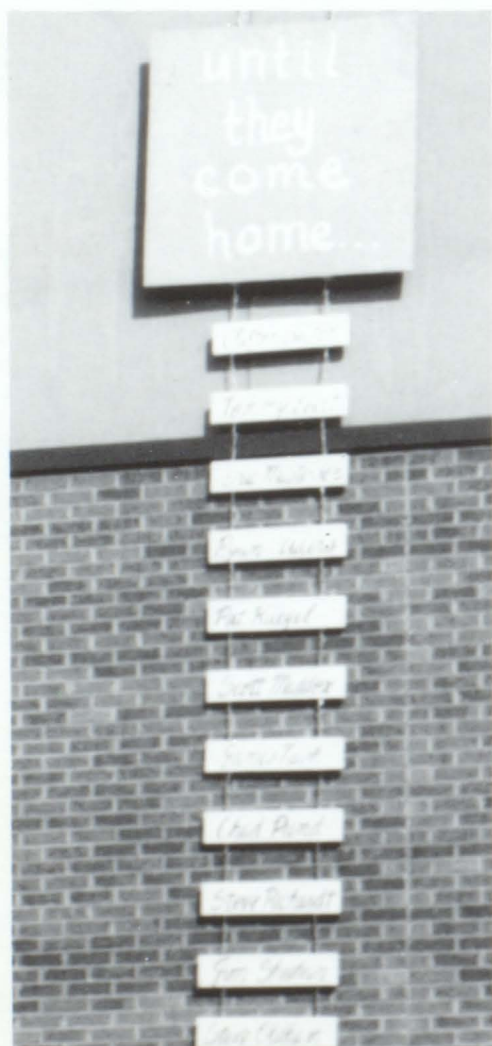
