

















1980 — Another year in the life of the H.H.H.S. Patriots. A year composed of approximately 1103 students and 54 faculty members and personnel all working together on the educational process.




















ADDITIONS





DARLENE AS QUEEN




Another first this year was the formation of a girl's tennis team. Lynn Duss was awarded Most Valuable and Tammy Huffman was given the Most Improved award.


Torremolinos on the Mediterranean Sea is a great vacation spot. We enjoyed the beach, shopping, and even saw a Flamenco show.

The imperial city of Toledo reflects the multiple origins of Spain. Among the interesting places we visited was the Escorial (a monastery, palace, and burial place of kings.)
















A GROWING YEAR


Congratulations are also in order for the J.V. squad who ended its season on a winning foot with a ten and eight record. Impressive results will sure follow these girls in the upcoming years.

Hoosier hysteria was definitely at its best this past season here at Heritage Hills. Congratulations guys on a job well done.!




SCORES A WINNING SEASON


GIRL'S TENNIS






"DOING THEIR PART"
