





American Problems Joins Social Studies Department





Dale's season was further hindered when Wes Loughead, one of the teams outstanding halfbacks, moved to another school before the end of the season. Mr. Bardwell, Dale's new coach, helped to arouse competition between players by setting up a Mr. Defense contest for each game. The title, Mr. Defense, was determined by a point system for touchdowns, tackles, interceptions, and recoveries. Ron Estes, Russ Winkler, and Ken Ringeman achieved the Mr. Defense title for their crushing defensive plays with Estes holding the title more times than any of the other players. The football season ended with seniors, Ron Estes and Van Martin elected to the all PAC teams.




Grueling Practices Keep Aces Fit

Late Season Surge Earns

Fighting to uphold Dale's basketball tradition, the '67-68 Aces went on a winning spree near the end of the season to finish with an even record of 10 wins and 10 losses. The spirited Aces overcame a streak of early season bad luck to down 5 of their last 7 regular season opponents including such highly touted teams as Tecumseh and Evansville Harrison. These victories more than avenged the heart-breaking losses that were suffered earlier in the year—such as the 1-point loss to Memorial, the 3-point decision at Petersburg, and the 4-point defeat at the hands of the Ferdinand Crusaders. In all, Dale lost 7 games by 7 points or less.



Dale's Golden Aces, making their debut in the Boonville Sectional, emerged as Southern Indiana's Cinderella team by winning their first sectional crown in a decade. The underrated Aces started strong on opening night by downing the host Boonville Pioneers 68-50. Advancing to the semifinals, they squeaked by Winslow 60-58 on a last second shot by Ron Estes. This set the stage for the championship clash against the Tecumseh Braves. The Aces opened up an early lead but had to repel a second half surge by the Braves to take a 77-69 overtime win and the championship.




Diamond Aces Rack Up Winning Season








