




Spanish Students Tour Europe










The netters were a very young team. Jade Hirt was the only senior on the squad. Therefore, next season should be exciting.








Frosh Go Undefeated




Wrestling Team Makes Comeback




















Basketball Shares Second In P.A.C.







Girls' track finished in fourth place in the conference. They were led by senior, Jill Lifke. She won the 200 meter championship. It was their only first place finish.






Fella and Beeler Take Charge


In the regional, Princeton edged the Patriots, 4-3, in nine innings.


